WASHINGTON TEAM GETS ONE BASKET

Salem Gagers Whip Ball Through Hoop From Every Angle of Floor

WHITE SALMON, Wash., Feb. 5.—(Special to The Statesman.)—Salem high school defeated the White Salmon high school team here tonight, 43-5. The game was fast—but all the speed was shown by the visitors.

During the entire contest the local boys scored but one field goal, gaining their other three points on free throws. The visiting boys, however, showed their chief asset, ability to shoot from under the basket. Practically their whole score was rung up from within the ten foot line.

DELANEY AGAIN IS VICTOR IN BATTLE

Johnny Risko Loses in Ten Round Event; Delaney Shows Cleverness

NEW YORK, Feb. 5.—(By Associated Press.)—Jack Delaney of Bridgeport, Conn., outstanding challenger for the world's light heavyweight championship, stepped into the heavyweight ranks for the second time within a month and decisively outpointed Johnny Risko of Cleveland in a 10-round fight at Madison Square Garden tonight.

Risko, with a record of having never been knocked off his feet in 18 professional fights, was the aggressor right from the start, never giving Delaney a chance to lead, but he was too erratic in his timing. Weighing 189 pounds, 19 more than Delaney, Risko had a

style which recalled the wild rushes of Luis Angel Firpo. He threatened to sweep Delaney to the canvas in the first round, but the clever Bridgeport can nimbly sidestep and crossed with right and left, jarring the Cleveland with every blow.

In the second round Risko rushed Delaney off his feet, crashing him to the canvas in a collision. Most of the way Delaney was content to stand off and box his way out of trouble. He was hurt repeatedly when Risko was fortunate enough to get within range and land with his right.
