Clark married Kate Brooks, who was born near the present site of Clarksdale and who spent her entire lifetime in that vicinity. William continued in that business with occasional political interruptions until 1879, when he eloped with Anna Pierce. Since that day none of the family has heard a word from him, directly or indirectly, the Cottrells said. Clark, who disappeared he left in charge of the drug store Ben Clark, son of his brother John, explaining that he would be gone a little while. Ben Clark now lives in Denver, where he is president of the Colorado State bank.
