for 1925 of \$16,202.04. The tax for the Salem district is set at \$203,758.87, an increase over last year of \$7,575.34. The valuation for 1925 is given as \$15,205,887 for Salem schools. Last year it was \$13,920 less.

The tax for the city of Salem was increased \$15,284.74 over last year, and the valuation was increased \$846,738. Salem valuation is set at \$14,281,363 for 1925.

Civic Music Club Presents Susie Michael and Misha Gegna in Brilliant Concert

Joint Concert Given by Pianist and Violin-Cellist Last Night at Heilig Wins Favor

A good sized audience heard one of the most scintillant musical offerings of the 1925-26 season last night at the Heilig theater when Susie Michael, the American pianist, and Misha Gegna, the Russian violinist, were presented in joint concert under the auspices of the Civic Music club.

The program opened with seven Mozart-Beethoven variations for cello and piano, a number that was richly applauded for its harmonic perfection—the sonorous cello in predominance.

Miss Michael, the pianist and accompanist, plays with a jubilant warmth of tone, and her technique is a demonstration of a liting unsophisticated style. As her opening group she gave three of Chopin's most colorfully written numbers—the F sharp major nocturne, the A-flat waltz, and a dashing impromptu.

Saint-Saens magnificent Concerto in A minor was chosen last night by Mr. Gegna for an unsurpassed cello rendition.—his famous Guarnerius responding with

beauty and supple virility to a masterfully handled bow and almost uncannily sensitized finger action.
