### Utah Pine Nuts Used to Re-Forest Persian Fields

OGDEN, Utah—Twenty-five cents' worth of pine nuts purchased three years ago from a local fruit store are helping re-forest Persia.

Three years ago H. Reiben, at Tabriz, wrote F. S. Baker, of the forest service headquarters, asking for tree seeds. He was experimenting to find a species adapted for Persia.

Baker had no seed at hand; but he went to a neighboring fruit store and bought twenty-five cents' worth of pine nuts, sent them to Reiben and forgot the matter.

Recently, he received another letter from Reiben reporting that the seed had thrived and asking more of the same variety.

Mr. Baker has invested another twenty-five cents and the fruit store product is on its way to Tabriz.

### OREGON POULTRY MEN LOSE MEET

Extended Time Limit Is Too Short in Which to Raise Necessary Funds

Regardless of the fact that an extension of 30 days time was given Portland and Oregon poultrymen from January 1 to February 1 in which to raise the \$2,000 necessary to finance the holding of the National American Poultry association convention at Portland in August this year, the poultrymen failed to raise anywhere near this sum and the convention offer to Portland was withdrawn a few days ago.

The board of directors of the American Poultry association held a meeting at once and Peoria, Ill., was named as second choice for the 1926 convention city, all requirements having been promptly met by the poultry organizations of that city and state.

Oregon poultrymen have lost a golden opportunity to be put on the poultry map. This national convention has been held in both California and Washington in recent years, at San Francisco and Seattle, respectively, where the same requirements as were made of Oregon this year were met promptly and the poultry business of these states has benefited immensely as a result. Now those eastern and middle western poultrymen will be convinced more than ever that "Oregon is a district over which one must travel to go from California to Washington, or vice versa," a statement made in one of the eastern poultry magazines recently.
