LOS ANGELES, Feb. 12.
(By Associated Press.)—Driving rains accompanied by high tides which lashed the coast from Santa Barbara to San Diego resulted today in interrupting train passage over the Santa Fe line from Los Angeles to San Diego and sent a five foot wall of water over the coast highway near San Juan Capistrano 60 miles south of here.

Silverton Berry Meeting Calls Small Fruits Good

SILVERTON, Feb. 12.—That the Evergreen blackberry is the best money crop of all the small fruits raised in Oregon is the belief of C. L. Long, horticultural specialist to Oregon Agricultural college Extension Service.

This statement was made here by Mr. Long at a meeting of berry growers held for the purpose of discussing the best cultural practices and the management of soils for large berry yields. William L. Teutsek, district agricultural agent of Oregon Agricultural college, also spoke.

In discussing the future outlook for the marketing of small fruits, and particularly of strawberries,

Mr. Long stated that the demand for cold process berries in barrels had improved conditions very much. It is a very promising situation throughout the United States are being rapidly increased and an over-production of barreling and fresh market berries in the near future is possible.

It was therefore recommended that canning strawberries of the Etterberg 121 and Clark's seedling varieties be grown wherever satisfactory yields can be obtained, as there is little danger of an over-production of these two splendid canning varieties.

The meeting here was one of a series of meetings scheduled by the OAC extension service with fruit growers in Marion county, and in addition to a good number of berry growers the agricultural class of the Silverton high school attended in a body.
