The causes of such conditions are admittedly numerous and complex. Lack of a sufficient number of competent physicians in rural communities is undoubtedly a contributing factor which itself has many causes.

Among the most important needs in many such communities is that of a modern and well-equipped hospital. Lack of reasonably available hospital facilities often means retarded medical progress.
