PHYSICIANS WARN

Real Danger Lies in Complications, Says State Board of Health

Warning against Influensa was sent out yesterday by the Oregon State Board of Lealth, in an arlicle detailing the extreme contareous quality of the disease. The warning reads:

While it is not cause for ser ious alarm there is an increasing number of cases of influenza being reported fr na all parts of the state. Influenza in a mild form is constantly present. The real world-wide epidemics have usually been preceded by a number of smaller epidemics which passed unnoticed.

Influenza has been hailed by successive generations as a new disease. It is, however, an old disease, and epidemics are recorded as early as 1500 A. D. Influenza is an acute, extremely

contagious disease resembling a severe cold, with fever, pain in the head, eyes, ears or muscles. It comes on suddenly and the general weakness is entirely out of proportion to the other symptoms. The disease is cotremely infectious. It is transmitted by saliva and mucus thrown out by coughing, spitting and sneezing, and can probably be ind'rec. transmitted by contact with eating utensils and perhaps, to some extent, by dust. The causalive agent of influenza is not known.

Susceptibility seems to be uni versal and the disease spreads through communities with speed and ease which indicates that there is very little natural resistance in the normal individual. The real menace of influenza is due to its complications, because it lowers the patient's resistance, especially his resistance to respiratory infections and thus makes him an easy prey to pneumonia.

The common cold should be regarded as aserious matter. The prevention of influence is largely a personal matter. Effective measures depend on the voluntary subjection of the habits of the Everyone should real a the serious nature of a "cold." A cold may be almost anything from a trivial "cold in the head" to pneu-monia. The infection may vary from the very mild to the most virulent known to medical sci-


