

### LINE PLANT WILL BE SHIPPED SOON

Tailor Shop, Show Shop and Small Tannery Considered by Officials

Work of dismantling the state lime plant at Gold Hill began yesterday, with forecasts indicating that the machinery will be crated and shipped here within the next two weeks, making possible the addition of this new industry to the prison plant, as a working unit within the month.

For the present the state lime board contemplates shipping the raw product from the quarry at Marble Mountain, near Grants Pass, the present contract holding for at least one more year. The rock crusher at Gold Hill, with a capacity of 10 tons of fertilizer per hour, will probably be retired from service for the present but it is hoped, a suitable quarry will be found nearer to Salem, when the machine can be used at a later date.

On the so-called "island," east of the race from the main penitentiary building but within the enclosure, quarters for the machinery will be constructed, the enclosure of the pulverizer, requiring 30-horsepower to operate, being dust proof, in order that the finely pulverized lime dust will not pollute the water used in the retting of flax in the penitentiary plant.

It is estimated that 20 men will find employment in the operation of the new industry. As operated at present a smaller number is required, but wheelbarrows and hand labor will supplement the elevators used at Gold Hill. Capacity of the plant at a maximum will be 10 tons of lime fertilizer per hour.

Under the present contract the state will pay \$1.25 a ton for the raw lime. Freight to Salem is set at \$2 a ton, which brings the raw cost here to \$3.25. It is estimated that, with prison labor, the manufactured product will sell at from 95 cents to \$1.95 less to farmers of this section than when the work was done at Gold Hill. For the past months the Gold Hill plant has been operating at a loss, which would have necessitated an increase in the price to farmers of at least 50 cents a ton, had the plant remained there.

Prison authorities are now looking for a quarry to furnish rock for the stone-breaking industry, soon to be added at the penitentiary. Rock broken by convict's sledgeshammers will be used on roads within the prison grounds.

More Prison Industries  
Plans have been formulated for some time to provide better quarters for the prison tailor shop and the prison shoe making shop. A new building may be constructed very soon for these industries, partly, with a view to increasing the output of the shoe shop; eventually to make all the shoes needed at all the state institutions in Oregon.

A small tannery is also being considered, but large enough to furnish the leather for the shoes, and perhaps for harness and other uses at the state institutions.

It will be necessary to draw on the revolving fund for the money, or at least part of it, to install the lime plant at the penitentiary. On this account it may be necessary to charge a higher price for the lime to the farmers for a time than will be charged later; but there will no doubt be a considerable saving to them from the start.

### BURGLARS USE TUNNEL

\$100,000 IN FURS ARE STOLEN THROUGH PASSAGE  
NEW YORK, March 1.—(By Associated Press.)—Robbers circumscribed an elaborate burglar alarm system by a tunnel, from which they removed five tons of earth and stole furs worth \$100,000 yesterday from the Julius Klugman's Sons Inc., establishment in Manhattan. Working within 100 feet of a police station across the street, they are believed to have required a week for the operation, in which they dug a deep perpendicular hole and then went horizontally for more than 25 feet, piercing the foundations of two buildings.

The robbers rented a vacant store in the rear of the fur establishment. A partition was erected to cut off the view of the rear of the store from the street, and the tunnel was dug from the shop. The dirt and rock was piled on the floor.

The passageway was round so that, when the men broke through the last wall the loot was easily accessible. Detectives working on the case, said it was one of the most painstaking plots ever encountered.

### SHUMWAY TALKS ON FARM NEEDS

"Growers Are Entitled to Protection," Declares Candidate

It is not possible to curtail production, declared A. R. Shumway, candidate for the republican nomination for United States senator, who addressed members of the Salem chamber of commerce at the noon luncheon Monday.

"Such a method will not bring prosperity to the farmer. For if the farmers are asked to curtail, say, the wheat crop, they will all agree to do so. Then, thinking the rest will plant lightly, many will plant twice as much as normal, looking for a clear market and high prices.

"Yet the farmers are surely entitled to protection," Mr. Shumway declared. "The railroad is allowed by the interstate commerce commission to charge rates that will permit a fair return. Labor is granted protection. Manufacturers are aided by the tariff. But little protection has been given the farmer.

"The prosperity of the state is entirely dependent upon the prosperity of the farmer. Farm production is steady and not decreasing, as the lumber industry

and mining industry are bound to be when the resources they work are reduced steadily.

"If there were no farmers in the state of Oregon there would be no state of Oregon. The farmers should be given ample protection."

Mr. Shumway also declared himself emphatically in favor of prohibition.

Nevertheless the senate judiciary committee has decided to hear next Monday the proposals of Senators Edge, Republican, and Edwards, democrat of New Jersey, and Bruce, democrat, Maryland, for amendment of the Volstead act. These senators are insistent on a general public hearing by this or a select committee on the whole subject of prohibition enforcement. Unwilling to make an estimate of the effect of the prohibition law himself, Mr. Andrews deploded today the increasing number of "wild statements" and expressed the opinion that, if proper enforcement were to be possible, public mind must be quieted. Mr. Mellon on the other hand held that the public generally knew the facts about prohibition and was in a position to obtain any information which a general commission might.
