FILBERT PLANTING URGED BY SPEAKER

Finest filberts in the world are now right here in the Willamette Valley, declared J. J. Doerfler of Marion county, who spoke of filberts before the Marion-Folk County Realtors' association yesterday noon.

In spite of this fact, right here in Oregon filberts are being imported from Turkey and from Italy and from Sicily. The imported nuts are of very inferior quality, some of them being so wormy they are not permitted entrance to the United States.

But Oregon, although the best filbert country known, has been reticent about planting the trees, largely because pioneers in the field have been content with bush crops instead of planting fine tree orchards.

Mr. Doerfler gave as the reason for so little acreage in filbert cultivation the assertion that Oregonians are especially those in the Willamette valley are innately and incurably conservative.

"We Oregonians head the list in nothing but freak legislation," Mr. Doerfler declared. California has too high a temperature in the summer time to be successful in extensive filbert cultivation. Practically none of the nuts are grown east of the rocky mountains. Hence, about the only real filbert land in the United States is in Southern Washington and the Willamette valley.

Yet about 25,000,000 pounds of filberts are imported to this country annually. To supply this quantity of nuts, it would be necessary to have in cultivation about 20,000 acres. Yet there are only about 300 acres of filberts in first class condition in the entire Willamette valley.

It is a sure fire crop. There is no off years if the trees are of the right sort and attention is given as it should be. The trouble seems to be that farmers in planting the nuts give little attention to the kind of soil needed. River bottom land produces perhaps the heaviest quantity but the highest quality filberts are produced on the hilly land.

Filberts is one of the nicest crops to harvest. The nuts "hush themselves." They yield from 2000 to 3000 pounds per acre, and

are one of the best paying crops in the valley. "It is only a matter of five or 10 years," declared Doerfler, "until the filbert industry will be one of the most important in the Willamette valley."

HENRY SYLVESTER LOSS IS MOURNED

Born in 1835, Picturesque Figure Passes After Useful Career

With the passing of Henry Sylvester Clement, on Wednesday evening, March 3, at the home of his son, Dr. L. O. Clement, 910 North Capitol, the last chapter of a very useful and interesting life was written.

He was born March 15, 1835, at Windsor, Vermont, and at an early age entered the tanning business.

In 1857 he went to Minnesota, where he took up a homestead, and while proving up on his claim suffered a great many hardships from the Indians, wolves, and often 40 degree below zero weather in a thin board shanty.

At 33 years of age he married Nellie Wilcox and to them were born six children of whom five are still living. After several years he left the farm going to Waseca, Minn., where he engaged in the iron machinery business.

In 1860 he united with the Methodist church, later transferring his membership to the Congregational church of which his entire family were members.

During the last 20 years of his life he has been retired from business and has not only enjoyed his children and their families, but they have all enjoyed him. He is survived by one daughter, Mrs. F. R. Hagerty of Eugene, and four sons, Dr. L. O. Clement of this city with whom he made his home for the past six years; W. A. Clement of Waseca, Minn.; E. H. of Santa Rosa, Cal.; and A. E. of Medford, also one brother Dwight, age 39, of Tully, Mass.

As was his desire, the remains will be cremated and the ashes shipped to Waseca, Minn., to be buried beside his wife there.

VESSEL SINKS WITH LARGE LUMBER CARGO

Hill, manager of the Twin Harbor Stevedore company, declared at 6:40 o'clock that the tug John Cudahy and Tye were returning to Hoquiam with all members of the crew. Captain Charles M. Hansen of Hoquiam was piloting the ship across the bar.

According to wireless reports received here all day, the bar and sea have been smooth. The Horaisan Maru went aground about 4 o'clock, it is said, and is believed to have been damaged so that she became unmanageable. She carried a heavy deckload of lumber and was listing when she left Shafter Mill in Aberdeen this afternoon.

The coast guard cutter from the Westport coast guard station assisted in the rescue of the crew and Captain Persson, commander of the station, believes that none has been lost. The men are aboard the tug Dodeca, pilot boat for the Horaisan Maru, the tug Tye and the John Cudahy. The tugs are reported to have picked up 43 men, believed to be the entire crew.

The Horaisan Maru is a ship of 4,000 tons net, one of the largest to enter Grays harbor, 150 feet long, owned by the Mitsui Steamship company. She carried a large quantity of wheat loaded at Vancouver, B. C. in her holds,

and about 4,000,000 board feet of large timbers, piles and other lumber, loaded at the Grays Harbor port terminal and the Schaefer Dolphins in Aberdeen. The ship had about a two foot list, when she went down the harbor, according to officers of the Stevedore company. The wheat in her holds made it difficult to trim the load and it was the plan to even her up by filling empty water tanks after she had crossed the bar. She drew about 26 feet of water.

The Horaisan Maru, which sank at the Grays Harbor bar tonight, is in about 35 feet of water, squarely across the Grays Harbor bar, and will constitute a serious menace to navigation entering or leaving the port, according to members of the crew of the tug John Cudahy which arrived at a local dock from the scene of the shipwreck at 8:55 o'clock tonight. Officials of the Twin Harbor Stevedore company say that the port will not be entirely bottled up, but danger of such a contingency is feared.

The holdings of C. S. Jensen and J. G. TOLL BRIDGES RULED ON SANCTION OF HIGHWAY COMMISSION MUST BE HAD

WASHINGTON, March 4.—(By Associated Press).—A new policy to govern the granting of congressional permits for the construction of private toll bridges on main highways was laid down today by the senate commerce committee.

Here after such permits must have the approval of the highway commissions of the state or states affected and must contain a requirement that the state or states or any political sub-division thereof may at any time acquire ownership of such bridges by purchase or condemnation proceedings.

The committee decided that after a bridge had been taken over by a state, the only governmental requirement would be reasonable tolls until such time as

LOAN MADE TO CHURCH

NEW YORK, March 4.—(By Associated Press).—Arrangements were completed by New York bankers today for a \$5,000,000 loan to the Roman Catholic church of Bavaria, representing the first long term public borrowing by a religious organization through Wall street channels. An offering of twenty year bonds is planned at an early date. The loan will be a direct obligation of the general union of the eight Bavarian diocese and the proceeds will be re-loaned by the Union for the construction of educational institutions and hospitals throughout the state of Bavaria. The most recent previous Catholic loan negotiated in this country was a credit of \$1,500,000 extended to the Vatican by the Chase National bank and Blair and company.

PIONEER IS CALLED
