Ruby Elizabeth Wheeler, 19, Fails to Recover From Operation

The death of Ruby Elizabeth Wheeler occurred Tuesday, March 3, 1926, after an illness of about 12 weeks. An operation for appendicitis was performed and the patient was not able to rally.

She was born near New Sharon, Iowa, August 13, 1906, and was 19 years, five months, and 19 days of age at the time of her death. She lived the greater part of her life in Idaho, attending both the Wendell and the Jerome public schools, graduating from the Jerome school in May, 1924. ### POULTRY FAILURES DUE TO POOR CARE

H. E. Cosby, OAC Expert, Addresses Fanciers of Auburn Section

Poor management and lack of attention to detail is responsible for most of the 90 per cent of failures in the poultry business, according to H. E. Cosby, poultry expert with the Oregon Agricultural college, who addressed a gathering of poultry raisers at the Auburn school, east of Salem, Thursday night. The meeting was held under the auspices of the Auburn community club.

Soil contamination, according to Cosby, is the most serious prob-

lem with which poultry producers have to contend and is responsible for most of the ills which beset the poultry business. Cosby declared that the first six months of the life of a pullet constituted by far the most important stage in the life of the fowl and the period during which was decided whether or the fowl would prove an asset or a liability to her owner.

Portable brooder houses with absolutely clean, new soil each year was emphasized by Cosby as the ideal method for brooding chicks in order to dodge the soil contamination problem. For those who are already established in the business with expensive brooder houses of the stationary type already built, Cosby declared concrete yards to be the only solution.

eral counties in Northern Utah and Southern Idaho, have saved a total of 14 lives since organization.

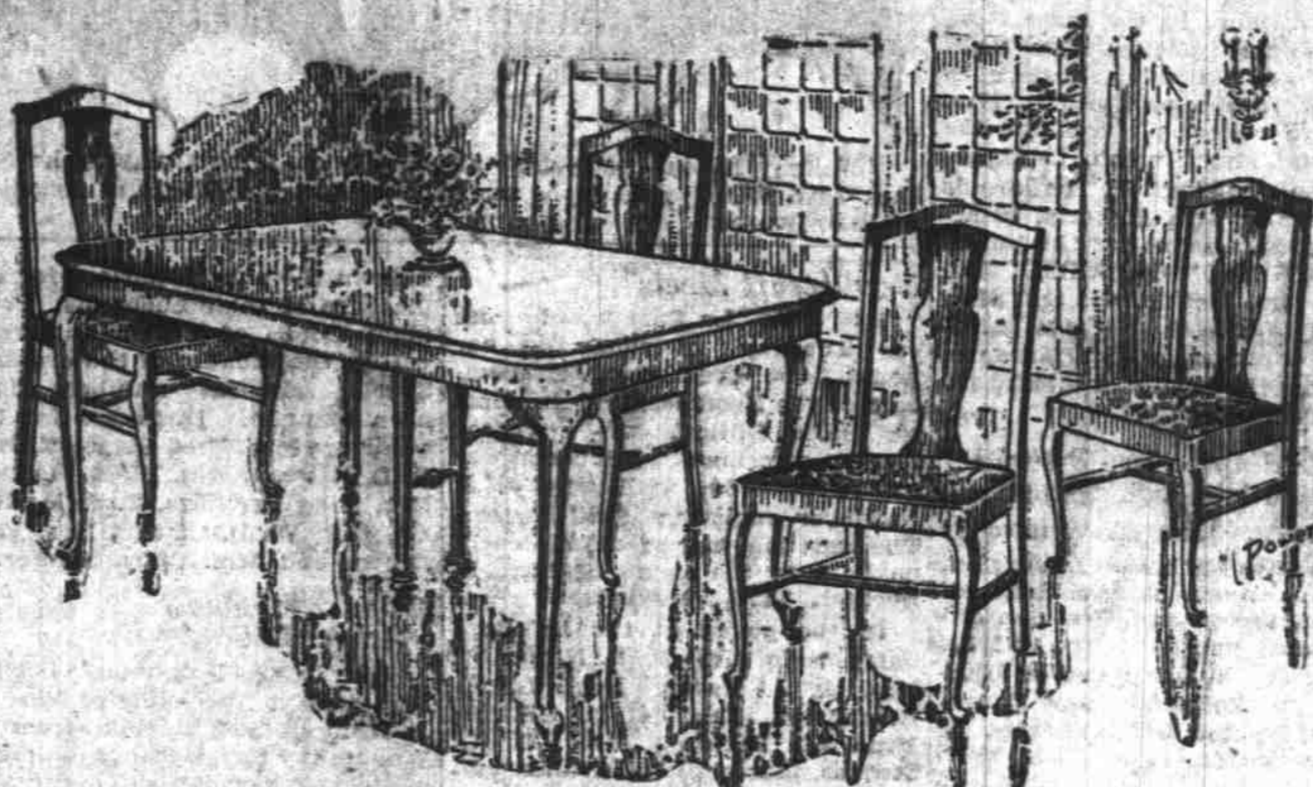
The majority of the rescues were of persons drowning; others were automobile accidents with death from bleeding, or fire

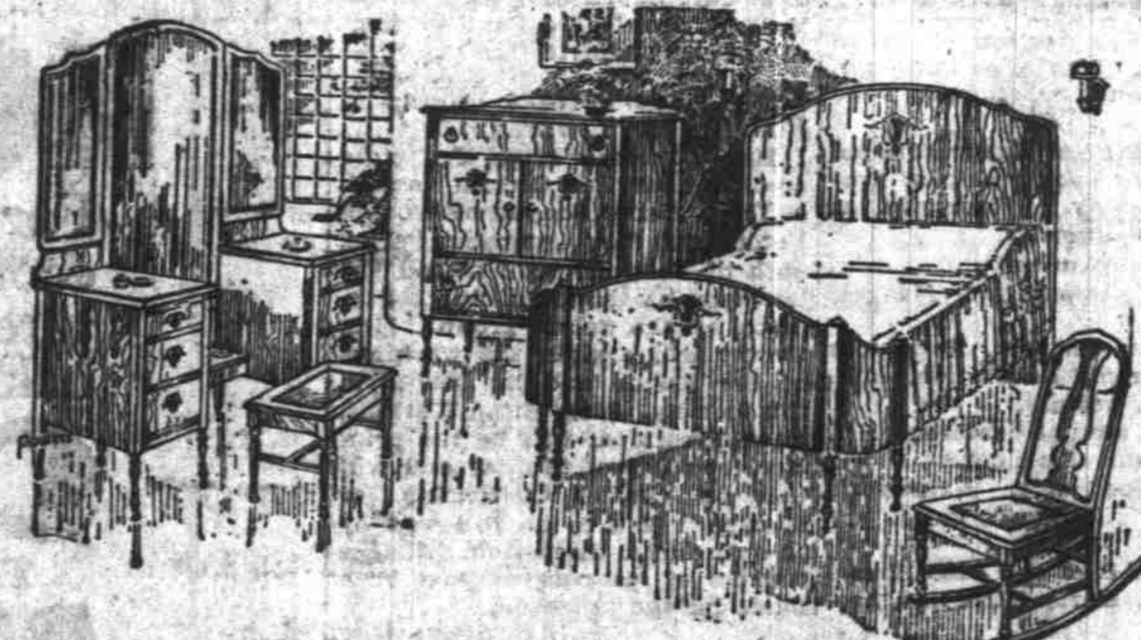
