PROMISED CRIME BOMB ATTRACTS FEW PERSONS

plauded, and now and then heckled.

When introduced, Judge Gatens of Portland, began quietly, expressing his appreciation of conscientious drys, and of religious workers. He spoke with tact, and polish. His remarks, in brief, followed:

"In my opinion the most despicable person we have in the community is the fellow who is publicly dry and privately wet.

"He hasn't the moral courage to come out and say how he stands upon the prohibition question. The question is not a one-sided one, but is a big question, and should be discussed only with a view of coming to some conclusion as to what is the best thing, under all the circumstances, for this state and nation.

"I have a high regard for the sincere prohibitionist, for I feel that in him we have a man who wants to do something for the benefit of our country and the world at large. He wants a law abiding country. They are usually clean, decent, and respectable people, and I am satisfied when they get know and appreciate that the present prohibition law has brought about more drunkenness, more immorality, more criminals and more juvenile crime than was ever known in the his-

tory of this country, that they will make some effort to modify the prohibition law so that it can be enforced.

"We were told that if the prohibition law would be enacted that there would be fewer people, if any, in jail. We would need fewer policemen, and there would be less crime. Today we have more people in jail than ever before in the history of the United States. We have more policemen and more enforcement officials than any country in the world. And we have more criminals, more people in the penitentiaries and county jails than we ever had.

"Sheriff Harburt of Multnomah county, in a report given to the Portland press, said:

"In 1923 there were 23 people sent to the county jail by the sheriff's forces for being drunk. During the year 1925 a total of 216 persons were arrested by the sheriff's forces and sent to the county jail for being drunk."
