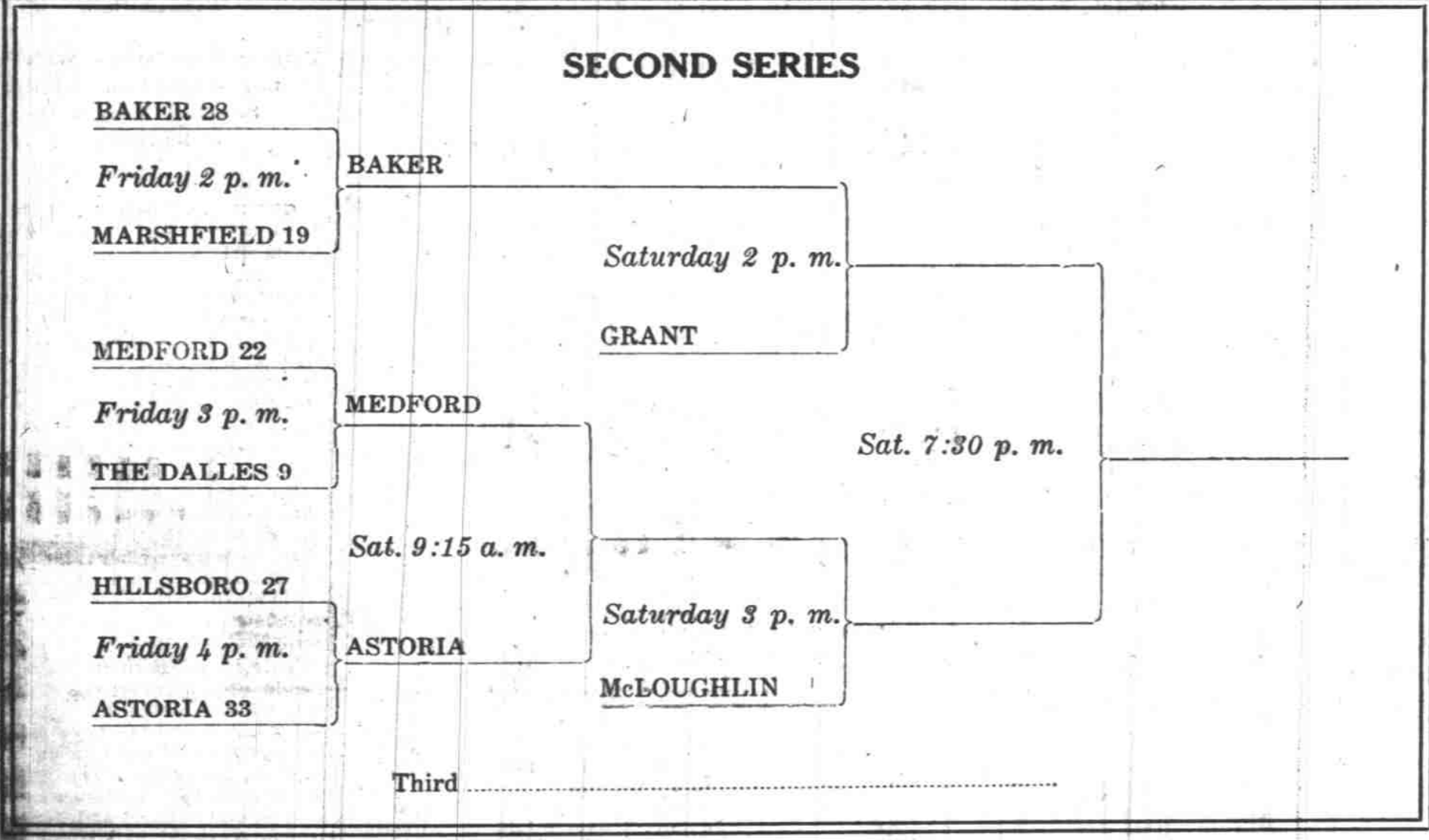
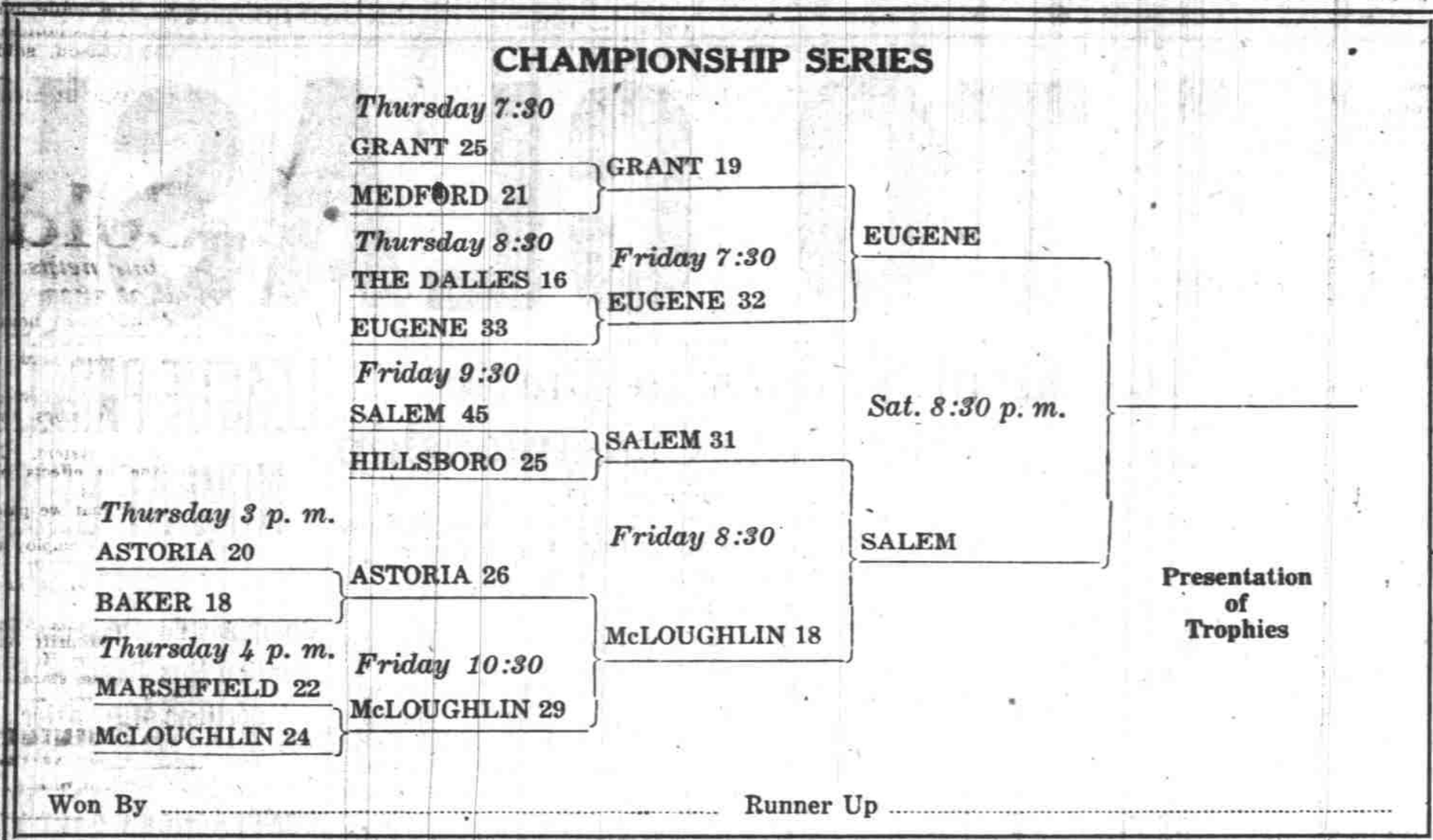


# Brilliant Playing by Eugene Forces Grant Five Into Second Position

### SALEM HI ENTERS FINALS BY SHOTS

McLoughlin Five Sent Into Second Series by Score of 31 to 18

Playing undoubtedly her fastest game of the season, Salem high school defeated the McLoughlin team Friday night, with a score of 31-18. By winning the game, the last semi-final of the evening, Salem has won the right to face Eugene high school this evening for the final clash for the state championship.

Salem took no chance in allowing the McLoughlin boys to snuff out her chances to play in the final round. From the middle of the first quarter until well toward the end of the game she worked insistently and steadily for points.

The start of the game was weak with the edge going to McLoughlin. Olinger and R. Drager started the scoring for the locals by making five successive long field goals. These two men are in guard positions and their free scoring was a feature of the game.

K. Potts started the scoring for McLoughlin by converting a foul called on Duffey. Duffey then made the score in Salem's favor by throwing two consecutive fouls called on Johnson. McLoughlin's scoring for the first quarter was completed when Karker and Johnson threw two goals making the score 5 to 2. Salem's guards then got busy and the quarter ended 10 to 5 in Salem's favor.

In the following quarter McLoughlin made but one point, a free throw by Weir, while Salem romped wild, tallying six goals and one free throw. Salem's forward-center combination started to function in this canto and remained working throughout the game. The half ended with Salem in possession of the large end of a 23-6 score.

The next quarter was one of much action and little scoring, both teams only chalking up two points each. The last period, however, saw the downfall of McLoughlin. Salem sent in her three guards who scored three goals to their opponents' four goals and one free throw. McLoughlin started the quarter with two throws followed by Salem's last three goals of the game. The cast-ers then ended the scoring with two goals and two free throws.

One feature of this game and the McLoughlin-Astoria game of the morning was the unwillingness of the five in advance to stall the game by keeping the ball out of their territory in the last few minutes of play. The second period of the fray proved to be serious to two players, one on each team. J. Drager of Salem received a cut above his eye when he came in contact with Karker of McLoughlin. Karker's nose entered the melee only to start bleeding later on in the game.

Duffey, of the locals, proved to be the high point man of the game with 12 points to his credit. R. Drager was second with seven counters and was tied by Johnson of McLoughlin who headed the list on his team. No one was put out on four personals in the game, though Seigmund of Salem received three. Coleman refereed this game as well as the first one in the evening.

### TRACK MEET IS TO BE HELD ON MONDAY

Pacific Coast Tournament at Palo Alto to Take Place Earlier

EUGENE, Ore., March 12.—(By Associated Press).—The Pacific coast conference track meet will be held at Palo Alto, Cal., May 15 instead of May 22, as formerly scheduled in order to allow the southern colleges to send teams to the national meets in the east May 22. It was announced here today. This change necessitates other changes in the schedule of the University of Oregon team as well as those of the University of Washington and Oregon Agricultural college. The Washington-OAC meet will be held in Seattle May 22 instead of May 11. The Oregon-OAC meet is to be at Corvallis May 29 instead of May 16 and the date of the Oregon-Washington meet at Eugene remains unchanged, May 8.

Final matches in the National Amateur Athletic union championships, will be held at the Oregon Agricultural college, April 15, 16 and 17, will be broadcast by the college radio station KOAC on Friday night, April 16, from 8:15 to 11 o'clock.

It is believed that this broadcast will mark the first attempt ever made to describe by radio the progress of wrestling matches. KOAC has successfully broadcast football and basketball games played on the college campus during the current year and will describe major campus track meets through the microphone.

The losers of Friday morning's game tangled in the third game of the afternoon. Astoria licked Hillsboro only by six points scored in overtime.

Hillsboro led the half 16-13 and the game ended a 27-27 tie. Extra minutes was allotted and Astoria's forwards romped in three baskets with uncanny ease.

In the first part of the game, both teams took to shooting long shots, but Eugene tightened up in the final canto and scored more continuously. Another of Grant's weakness lay in her failure to follow up her shots. Eugene guards returned practically all of Grant's shots.

This game puts the purple and white into the finals against Salem tonight at 8:30. This game promises to be the wisest of the season.

To show the gain by Eugene as the game progressed, the first quarter ended 6 to 4 for Grant, the half 12 to 10 for Eugene, the third quarter turned the tide and the period ended 23 to 14 for Eugene. At the end of the game, Eugene led 32 to 19.
