NATIONAL CHILD HEALTH DAY

The people of Marion county ought to be especially interested in National Child Health day, which is May 1— Because of the fact that this county is one of four in the United States carrying on a five year child health demonstration...

President Coolidge regards National Child Health day so highly that, every year, he writes to Secretary Hoover, president of the American Child Health association, to emphasize the need for general interest in child conservation—

And here are a few facts which should cause every citizen to cooperate with the President and the agencies back of National Child Health day:

Of the 1,500,000 of our population who die each year, it has been estimated that 42 per cent die from preventable causes. The waste occasioned by this preventable loss is estimated at a billion dollars.

Forty thousand school children die each year from causes which are preventable.

There are 400,000 cases of typhoid fever each year, ten per cent of which are fatal, and 75 per cent of these cases are unnecessary.

Diphtheria, which is considered preventable and for which there has been a curative for thirty years, takes the largest toll of death among children of any five common communicable diseases.

Of all crippled adults, one-third receive their injuries during the first six years of life and a very large percentage are needlessly handicapped.

One hundred per cent of all mental defectives are recognized during the first six years of life.

Says Mr. Hoover: "It is no wonder that Child Health day has taken hold of the imagination of the nation. The need for it was so great. Each year, the results will double until it has become a national habit, an almost subconscious impulse, to remember the child wisely, constructively, from the day that parents are born until the day their children become parents, that is, always. Then no words of any one man or woman will be necessary in defense of the nation's will that its children shall be well."

UNIFORMS FOR GUARDS

Within the next ten days to two weeks, the guards at the Oregon penitentiary will be uniformed. This is a proper thing, in line with good discipline—

So recognized by all authorities. It is an aid to keeping men on duty always "up on their toes," ready and in trim for emergencies. The uniforms are being made at the prison, and they are to be supplied to the guards at cost, which also is proper.

As has been said before in this corner of The Statesman, the best regulated and most successful prison of this class in the world in percentage of reformations, the Minnesota penitentiary at Stillwater, is under strict military discipline. The Oregon prison in working towards full self support and a wage for every worker, and other ways, is taking the Stillwater institution as a model, and it may safely do so also in the matter of uniforms for its guards, and strict discipline.

SOME SUNDAY SERMONS FROM SALEM PULPITS

Jesus' entry into Jerusalem: What 21:11, sermon by Dr. N. K. Tully, First Presbyterian church, Sunday morning.

What we call Palm Sunday commemorates the triumphal entry of our blessed Lord into Jerusalem, attended by swarming crowds shouting holy hurrahs, and casting their coats and palm branches before the beast on which he rode. Hitherto Jesus had given his efforts to dampening down popular enthusiasm and to the avoidance of provoking the authorities. But here was a complete reversal of policy. Now his work was over, all except His death. So He symbolically proclaimed His kingship, and deliberately rode into Jerusalem in a way that would hasten His death. For it was to die that He had come to earth.

It is significant that He rode upon an ass instead of a horse. In all ages the horse has been a symbol of war, but the ass a symbol of peace. Jesus is the Prince of Peace. He sat on a colt, too, whereon man had never sat, because he was occupying a position which no one else could fill. Jesus is in no class with others; He is our one and only Savior.

On the procession founded the hill and Jerusalem, resplendent in the sun, broke upon His vision, the bowed and lamented that the city was too stubborn to accept His philosophy. He foresaw the destruction which rejection of His
