UNIVERSITY HONORWomen Lead Men on List of  
Oregon's Best Scholars  
by Margin

UNIVERSITY OF OREGON, Eugene, March 30.—(Special.)—Salem is represented on the University of Oregon honor roll for high scholastic honors for the winter term by Ralph Bailey, a senior in economics, and Lela B. Sanders, a freshman in the English department.

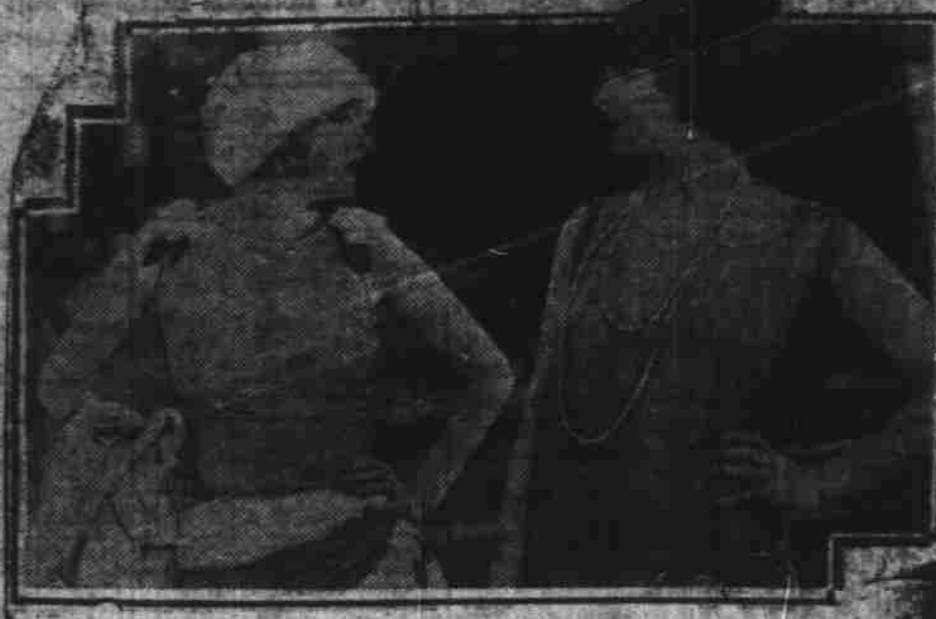
The honor roll includes 98 students, 53 women and 45 men, who made no grade less than 13 and who carried at least three subjects. Passing grades at the university range from I to V, which is the lowest passing grade. No account is taken in compiling the list of incompletes, or of grades received in personal hygiene, elementary physical education and military.

The grade records of all university students are published in the grade sheet, or "seal of honor," as it is commonly known, each term, and copies are sent to the parents and guardians of the students. The honor roll for the winter term contains the names of 22 students who were named for similar honors the preceding term.

CRIMINOLOGIST  
SPEAKS FRIDAYKate Richards O'Hare to  
Make Address on "Chal-  
lenge of Prisons"

Kate Richards O'Hare, leading woman criminologist of the United States, will give a lecture next Friday at the Salem armory. She will speak on "The Challenge of the Prison."

Mrs. O'Hare launched a drive against prison conditions after she had served a term in prison for alleged violation of the espionage act. She had advocated the Quaker doctrine of pacifism. Later the Church Federation of Chicago looked into the case and produced data proving her innocence of the charge. Immediately President Wilson commuted her sentence, and she was released May 29, 1920.

Upon obtaining her freedom she set about to secure the release of political prisoners, finally succeeding in doing so, it is said. She also resolved to work for the creation of a woman's prison by the federal government and to drive prison labor contractors out of the prisons.

Mrs. O'Hare is a member of the faculty of the Commonwealth college. The American Federation of Labor has secured her services to lecture on the prison situation, and that she might do so, she has been given a year's leave of absence from her college.

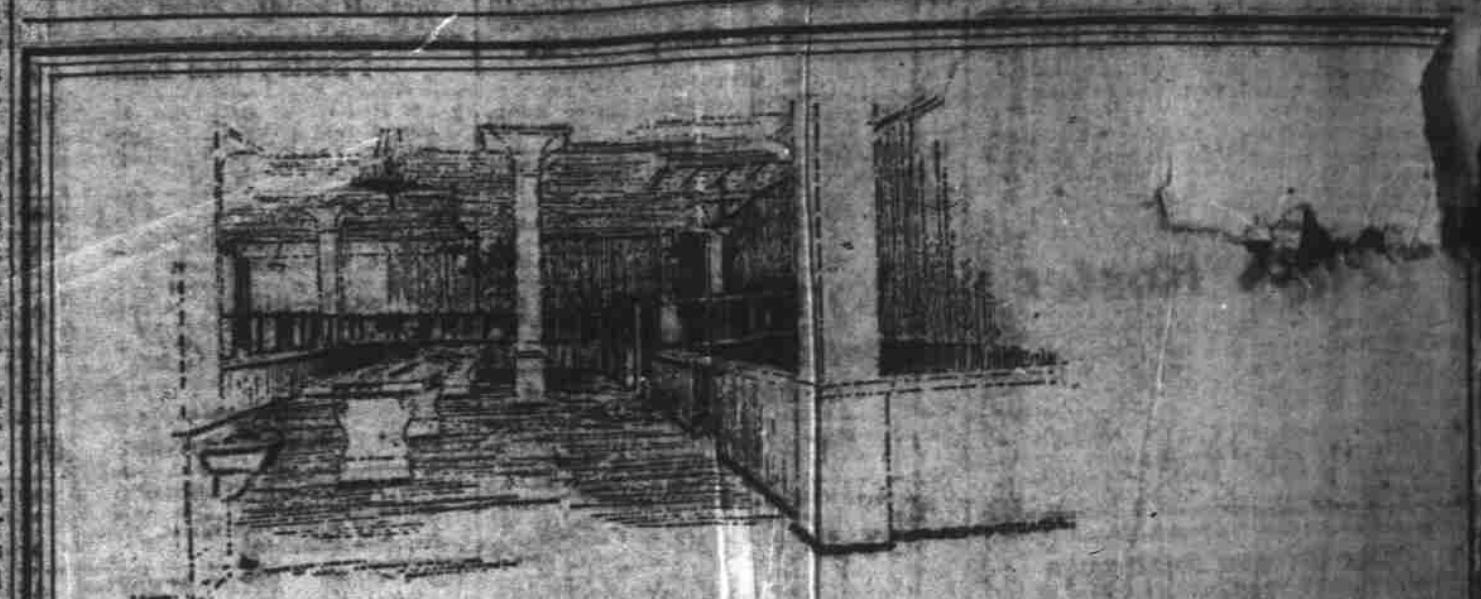
## PASS NORRIS BILL

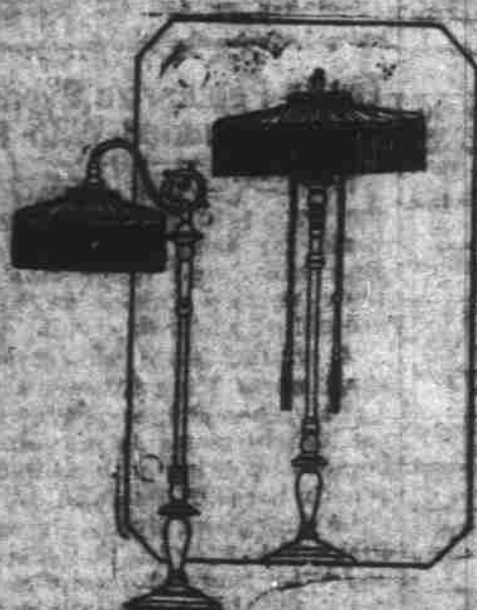
