State Boxing Commission, Two Years Old, Meets First Time Friday

LACK OF AUTHORITY PREVENTS ACTION

Governor Pierce Elected President, Tom Kay Secretary, Yesterday

The state boxing commission Friday held that it had no authority to settle a dispute between Joe Gorman, boxer, and members of the Klamath Falls boxing commission in connection with the distribution of receipts resulting from a boxing card held in Klamath Falls last February.

Gorman, in a letter to the state boxing commission, requested an order compelling the Klamath Falls boxing commission to pay him 20 per cent of the receipts of the card which aggregated \$800. Gorman alleged that he was fouled by Benny Dotson in the third or fourth round of the bout, and was compelled to retire from the ring because of injuries received. He charged that the boxing commission refused to recognize the foul, and later declined to award him 20 per cent of the receipts.

The state boxing commission held that its duties were of an advisory nature, and that it was powerless to take any action unless advice was asked by members of the Klamath Falls boxing commission or the city attorney there.

A similar decision was given by the state boxing commission in connection with a claim filed by Virgil Hamlin against the La Grande boxing commission. In the latter case the La Grande boxing commission alleged that the bout was framed and refused to reward the participants.

Although created more than two years ago Friday's meeting was the first ever held by the state boxing commission. Governor Pierce was elected chairman of the body, while Secretary of State Koser was elected secretary. Attorney General VanWinkle is the third member of the commission.

Ship Without a Country Flies Inter-Allied Flag
SAN PEDRO.—A ship without a country plies in the oil service out of this port and proves a puzzle to harbors of the world. It is the tanker Niobe, which carries gasoline from San Pedro to Hamburg, Germany. The Niobe was built in Germany during the war and afterward allotted to the United States. While the United States did not accept ownership of the vessel, the shipping board controls it and allotted the tanker to the Standard Oil company. An American crew is carried although the ship has no American papers. For a flag, the Niobe carries that of Inter-Allied Maritime council.

Every now and then he rubs his hands over his shirt or pant legs before delivering the ball. Just how much resin he collects and what part it plays in his delivery only he can answer.

As far as the fan is concerned, the presence of that little white bag adds an air of mystery to the game. Whenever the pitcher dusts off his hands with the bag the speculation arises as to whether he is using it to put "stuff" on the ball. "There he goes for the resin. Now watch him," they whisper. Japanese Adding Giant Plane to Air Equipment

TOKYO.—A bombing airplane of such immense dimensions that a train of seven freight cars is needed to transport it from factory to flying field, is being added to the Japanese aerial forces.

It is the first long-distance bombing airplane ever built in Japan. It is of all-metal type and has five machine guns with room for one and a half tons of bombs and torpedos. The flying speed is 200 kilometers an hour.

16 PRISONERS ESCAPE

WHOLESALE DELIVERY MADE IN NASHVILLE PRISON

NASHVILLE, Tenn., April 9.—(By A.P.)—Sixteen prisoners escaped from the state penitentiary in West Nashville tonight by overpowering guards and then leaving by the front entrance.

Once outside, the penitentiary convicts boarded a street car at the end of the line, and robbed the motorman and conductor. A few of the prisoners also robbed the driver of an automobile near the penitentiary gate and escaped in the machine.
