National League Women President Has Flowers for Hobby

The identification table begun yesterday of prominent women among the 900 delegates and visitors in attendance at the seventh annual convention of the League of Women Voters, now convening at the Hotel Statler, with the interesting activities and hobbies of those politically eminent women, who are St. Louis' guests for the week, as the keynote of its tabulating system, continues.

Yesterday one wondered at the variety of jobs and professions those able politicians of the fair sex had relegated to the far corners of their minds for the next few days while they grace the council tables on matters of state. Today one finds that their esteemed president, incumbent, is as prominent in paints as in politics, and that all indications are that she is to continue "sitting on top of the world" for the next two years.

Miss Belle Sherwin, president incumbent of the league, is a true apostle of the family slogan, "Sitting on Top of the World." It may not be paints, but its politics. She is a daughter of the founder of the famous Sherwin-Williams paint firm.

From all indications Miss Belle Sherwin will head the National League of Women Voters at their next two annual conferences, or possibly their next four biennial sessions. The issue is dependent upon two determining factors—the first, that Miss Sherwin will accept herself in office is practically assured, according to convention gossip. The second concerns a proposal that will come up for discussion during the week to the effect that the conventions hereafter shall be biannual instead of annual.

Miss Belle Sherwin was one of the first women to do jury service in Cleveland and has been instrumental in encouraging other women in her home city to look conscientiously upon jury service. She is a trustee of Wellesley college,

of which she is an alumna. A flower garden that is accorded one of the most beautiful in Cleveland and a lover of music are the league president's two hobbies.—St. Louis Daily Globe-Democrat.
