

O'Connor Sends Danny Garth To Mat Three Times In Second Round

PLUCKY SILVERTON FIGHTER DEFEATED

Main Event Ends in Second Round, Preliminaries Hold Up Strong

In a fast fight card at the Salem armory, last night, featured mainly by the quality of the preliminaries, though backed up well in the two rounds of the scheduled 10 round main attraction, Danny Garth, 162 pounds, Silverton fighter, was knocked to the floor three times by Mike O'Connor, billed as the undefeated Canadian welterweight, tipping the scales at 148 pounds.

The knock out brought the main battle to an abrupt close after a taste of mighty clever and strenuous going in the first round, and before the second round, which was the full period. Danny pushed the fighting during the opening moments, hitting heavy blows time and again, but appearing a bit too eager.

During these first moments, Mike O'Connor took his share of wallops, but towards the end of the first round, landed punches that were certain to tell before the fight had progressed far. As the going rang at the end of the first round, fans were speculating on whether the fight would last beyond the fifth or sixth.

Danny Garth came back strong in the second, though the exchange of blows was evenly divided, the shade being in favor of O'Connor. When the period was about over, a heavy blow to the solar plexus brought Garth to his knees, where he took eight counts. He came up showing the effect of the blow.

Availing himself of the opening which followed, O'Connor landed repeatedly, sending Garth to the canvas again. The plucky Silverton boy got to his feet a second time, but was obviously not in position to defend himself effectively. He fell again and was counted out.

Throughout the early moments Garth showed the weight of his famed blows, but seemed unable to take those of his opponent.

Jack Davis of Oregon City won the decision over Watts of Salem in the first preliminary. There was no clinching during the four rounds. Davis showed better form and ring generalship over his younger opponent. He floored Watts three times in the second, once for eight counts and twice in the third. Both fighters weighed in at 130 pounds.

Stocky Foley of Salem took the count in the third round of the scheduled four round preliminary with Russell Green, also from Salem. From the tap of the bell this pair mixed. The first round was fairly even with Green leading slightly in the second. Both fighters were working in the third but Green landed one to Foley's chin for the count. Both fighters weighed in at 127 pounds.

In the semi-wind-up Johnson, 137 pounds, of Portland, won the decision over Howe, 140 pounds, also of Portland. It was said that this same pair fought Tuesday night in Portland, Johnson winning from Howe by a knockout. Howe not being satisfied challenged Johnson for last night's event. Johnson was the aggressor, Howe's blows seeming to lack the necessary punch. Howe took the count for five in the third, but came back strong in the fourth fairly even. Johnson led in all the other rounds the decision being popular.

RICKARD SIGNS FOR SEPTEMBER MATCH

Promoter Gets Dempsey Contract; Gene Tunney May Be Challenger

FORT WORTH, Texas, April 21.—(By Associated Press.)—Tex Rickard's contract with Jack Dempsey for a championship bout in September, signed here today, does not place the promoter outside the rulings of the New York state boxing commission, although it leaves the way open for him to ignore the commission if he chooses. Rickard made this statement here tonight in a reply to word from New York that Commission Chairman James A. Farley had announced Rickard would be called before the board on his return to New York to explain his action in signing the contract.

"I have no present intention of opposing the rulings of the commission," Rickard said, "and my contract with Dempsey contains nothing in contravention with its rulings. At any rate, Farley is not the commission. There are two commissioners besides him."

Analyzed the articles of agreement to which the world's heavyweight champion and the famous promoter put their names here today merely require that Dempsey fight a championship bout in September with an opponent of Rickard's choosing, and that he fight no one in the meantime.

While Rickard reiterated at the time of signing the contract, his statement that he was inclined to match Gene Tunney, rather than Wills, against Dempsey, the contract does not specify any particular boxer as the champion's opponent. Neither does the contract specify that the match be held in

NEW LAVA FLOW STARTS

RANCH HOUSES ARE DESTROYED BY FIERY STREAM
