And because he finally realizes that there is little more glory before him in a game he has been master of for twice the length of the average active athletic career.

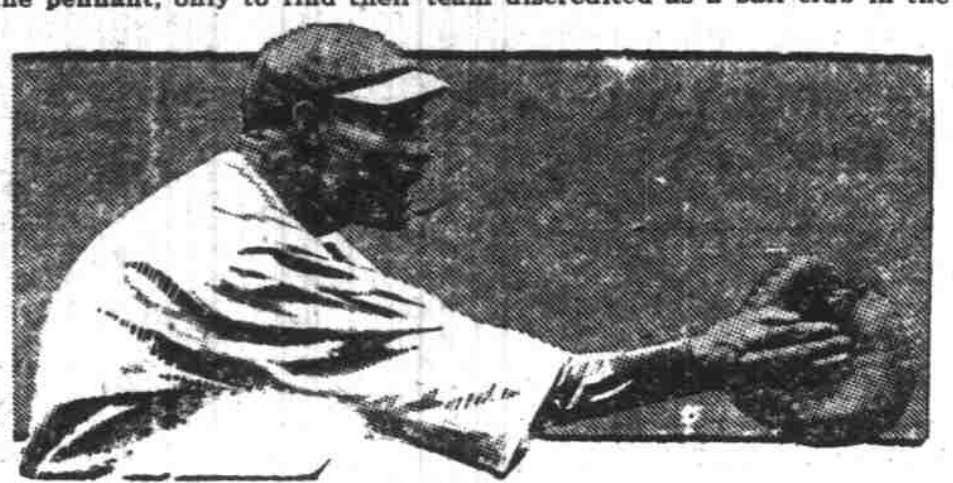

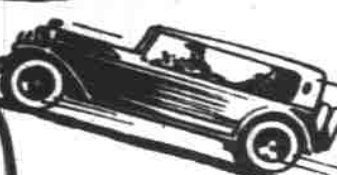
