ALIEN LICENSE STRICT MUST PAY \$25 TO STATE BEFORE ENTERING SPORT

The fact that aliens may not obtain either a hunting or fishing license in the state of Oregon without first applying for and obtaining what is known as a gun license was pointed out Friday by the state game commission. Some difficulty has been caused by failure to understand the law, Henry Stevenson, local deputy said. The state law provides that a fee of \$25 must be paid by all aliens before they shall be permitted to obtain a license for fishing or hunting. This fee is paid to the state as a "gun license" tax. Foreigners who have become naturalized or those who have taken out their second papers and made the oath of allegiance, are not required to take out the gun license. Those, however, who have secured the first papers only, or who have made no application for naturalization, must pay the required fee.

HOBO GATHERING OPENS: HIT ORGANIZED CHARITY

Introduced briefly by President Hirschberg, the several speakers of the evening devoted much of their time to dispassionate criticism of organized charity and private employment agencies. The dictum and delivery of these speakers was, for the most part, more scholarly than that of the Chamber of Commerce luncheon orators, but not so exuberant. The word "agenda" was used in referring to the convention program and the problems of the migratory worker were closely linked, in the words of the speakers, with national budgets and world economics. B. C. Anderson, a delegate from San Francisco, declared the convention will have achieved something if it but calls the public's attention to the plight of the migratory worker, whom the circumstances of seasonal employment drive from place to place and who frequently is confused in the public mind with the loafer and the tramp.

OIL FLAMES CONQUERED; FURTHER DANGER IS PAST

setting ever observed at a Kern county oil fire.

The intermittent illumination of lightning threw the workers and skyhigh pennant of smoke into sharp relief. Then the thundering reverberation attending the electrical display would add its roar to that of the fire. The heat was blistering and despite terrific downpour of rain workers were scorched by the proximity to the flames.

Almost as rapidly as the oil

crews threw up fire walls and dykes, cloudbursts would wash them out and obliterate the barricades of earth. After midnight the field of battle became a sea of mud. The Bakerfield forces of the oil company were augmented by relief crews rushed 45 miles from Taft to the scene of the fire. By early morning a thousand men were at the tank farm, 500 standing by for relief and 500 working. At 12:30 today the tank boiled over with dramatic suddenness, the oil driving the workers before it. There was a moment of intense suspense as the boiling oil seethed up the steel tank walls, but they held. The loss approximated \$300,000.
