VANDERBILT PLANS TO SUSPEND PAPER

San Francisco Herald May Be Dropped in Order to Carry Others

NEW YORK, April 30.—(By Associated Press.)—Publication of the San Francisco Herald will be suspended as a means of stabilizing other Vanderbilt newspapers, Cornelius Vanderbilt, Jr., head of the Vanderbilt newspapers, Inc., announced tonight through his counsel, Dudley Field Malone. Mr. Malone said suspension of the Sunday edition of the Los Angeles News and of the Monday edition of the Miami Tab is also contemplated. A Vanderbilt, who celebrated his 25th birthday today, received seven offers of financial assistance, one of which, Mr. Malone said, was for the purchase of the Los Angeles News for \$1,000,000. The responsibility of individuals or groups making these offers, together with five others previously made is now under investigation, Mr. Malone said. Mr. Malone said that the losses of the San Francisco paper have been more than 50 per cent of the corporation's total monthly income, and that experts had advised relief from "this heavy burden in order that the papers in Miami and Los Angeles might see carry themselves on their own incomes." The 12 offers of financial assistance in the present crisis of the Vanderbilt publications were based on young Vanderbilt's proposal to pledge his patrimony of \$1,500,000 as security for a loan of \$300,000, he said today. The threatened crash of the Vanderbilt newspapers, which the young publisher and heir to the Vanderbilt riches says he can avert with \$300,000 came to light when it was revealed that the Vanderbilt family had withdrawn their further support from the enterprises. Young Vanderbilt retained Dudley Field Malone and Clarence Darrow as his advisors.
