**DEFENSE PLAN IS MADE BY MITCHELL** (Continued from page 1.)

Press club on "America's Place in the Air."

At that time he will tell what, in his opinion, is necessary to safeguard the interests of America's citizenry and property.

At present, he said, the United States has no defense.

"Surface vessels no longer are adequate protection," he declared, "for it has been demonstrated that they are at the mercy of aircraft. Land forces also are not adequate, as was shown in the last war, when armies were annihilated for about three years, including in an orgy of killing."

"As it stands now, counting a country's entire defense 100 per cent, the navy about 30 per cent, and aircraft makes up the other half."

Colonel Mitchell expressed the belief that the next war would be a striking combination of the use of aircraft and chemicals, and he pointed to development of aerial torpedo and devastating gases as evidence of that trend.

Development of commercial airways and aircraft automatically would develop protective powers, he declared. In time of stress means of rapid communication would be available; he said fliers and modern equipment would be on hand and these resources immediately could be turned to defensive ends.

One of the first step developments, in his opinion, should be that of an air route from the Pacific northwest of Alaska, through a treaty with Canadian authorities. "This route would be by way of the Columbia, Athabasca and Mackenzie rivers and through the Yukon to Alaska. This step would be absolutely essential in case of war, Colonel Mitchell averred."

**GOTHENBURG**—Olympic contests for women only, to which all nations will be invited to send two competitors for each event, have now been definitely arranged for August 27-29 in Gothenburg this year.

They will mark the second international contest of the kind, held under the auspices of "La Federation Sportive Feminine Internationale," and since this body also plans to cooperate with the international Olympic committee in future games, the official title of the meet in Sweden this summer will be "The Second International Athletic Games for Women."
