

Salem Protests Albany Game Following Riotous Tenth Inning Clash

LOCALS LEAD PLAY UNTIL LAST FRAME

Three Players Draw Fines, Umpire Scored by Fans During Blowup

Salem Senators dropped victory in a riotous tenth inning clash with Albany, at Albany on Sunday, by the tune of 4 to 3.

It was a good game until the ninth, when accounts differ. Till then Senators were declared to have had things easy, leading the Albany side in all phases of play. The score at the beginning of the ninth stood 3 to 1 in favor of Salem.

Then, it is alleged, the tenth man entered in the form of Rankin, umpire, who until that moment had seemed to function in correct form. 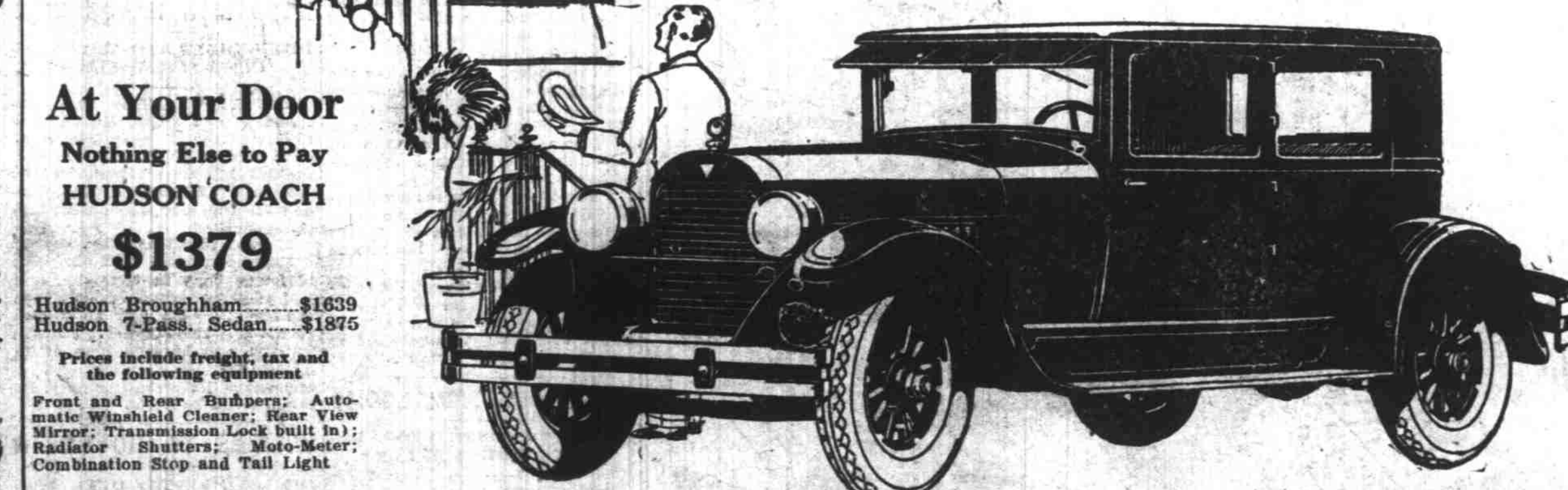

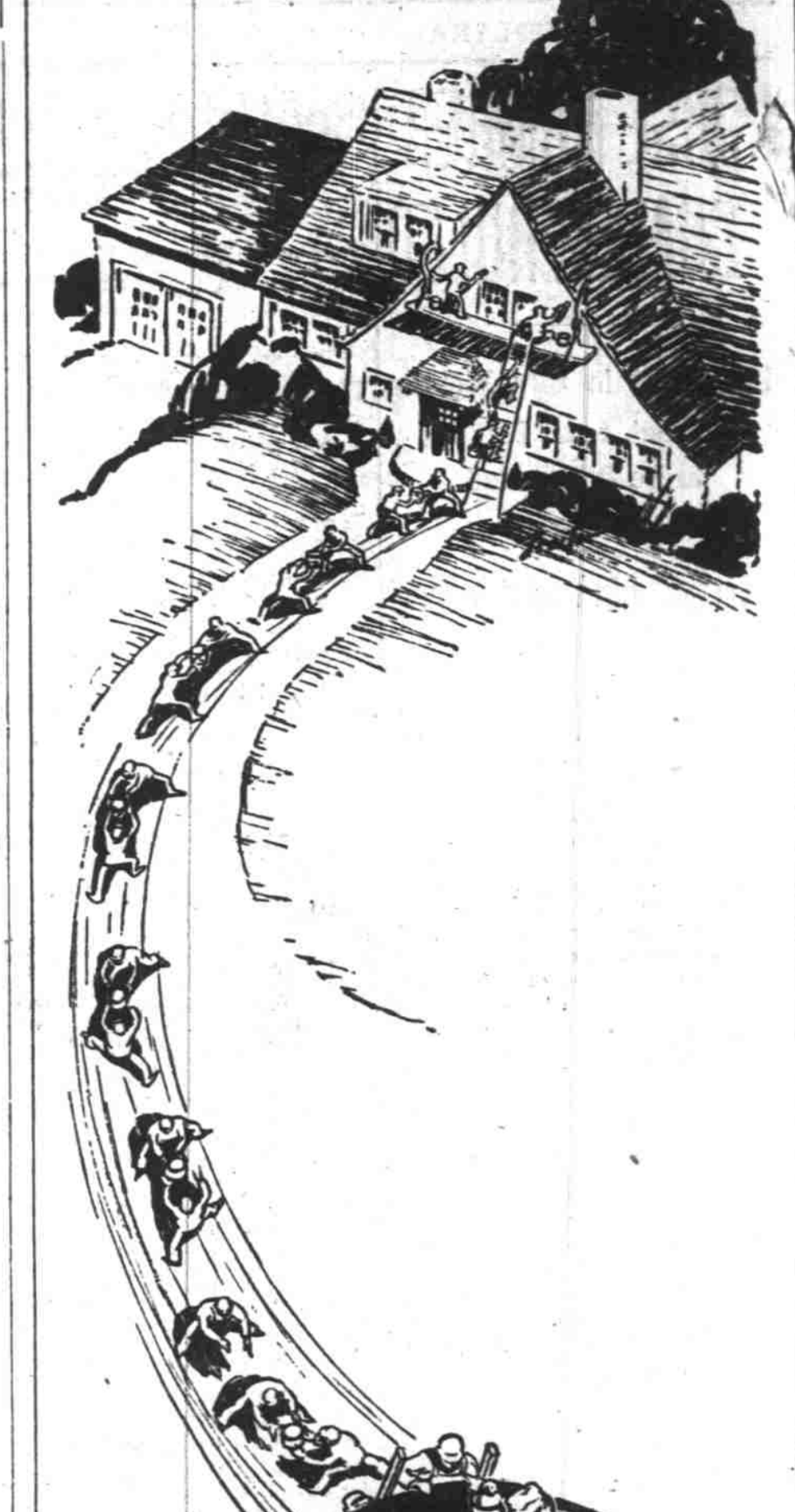
