The 16-piece Sacred Heart Academy orchestra displayed excellent training. "The Fantasia de Concert" (Hummel) and the "Shepherd's Dance" (Sartorio) were both played with exquisite feeling.

The Salem High school chorus, with Lena Belle Tartar as the director, and with Miss Truth Huston at the piano, sang De Reef's "Come to the Gay Feast of Song" and "The Hunter's Call" (Vesale) with a beautiful modulations and consummation of parts.
