

Phil Bayes Wins In Seventh Over Jimmy Anderson, Astoria Fighter

REFEREE ENDS GO WITHOUT COUNTS

Preliminaries Featured by Two Knockouts, Fair Crowd Present

In a main fight lacking the thrills of the usual Army offering, Phil Bayes, of Salem, was given what amounted to a technical knock out over Jimmy Anderson, of Astoria, in the seventh round of their battle.

Lots of clinching and swings that went wild by a large margin featured the go, and only in the third and fifth frames was Bayes working in usual form, coming to the front with his left. Anderson's left eye was opened, in the third by a left swing and the Astoria fighter took the count of five in the fifth.

Then followed more rounds in which both fighters landed some good blows, missed as many and clinched frequently. In the seventh, Phil showed more force, let Anderson have a couple lefts that he ducked by falling to the floor. When the Astoria boy got to his feet again, Bayes landed a left hook that floored him and the referee called the fight. Bayes favor though no count was made. Both boys were winded.

Bayes weighed in at 127 pounds while Anderson tipped the scales at 125.

The preliminary bouts of the evening were more interesting. Bronson, of Salem, scored a knock out in the third round over Davis, of Oregon City, while Clark, of Portland, walloped Farrar, of Salem, to sleep in the first round of their fight with three good rights.

The first preliminary was a general mix of long legs and arms in four rounds of three minutes, in which two Salem boys, Jimmy Smith and Frank Payton, were the participants. Payton was given the decision in the second after one minute and 50 seconds.

Smith was well winded near the end.

The second go was a four round match between Bronson of Salem and Davis of Oregon City. Bronson knocking out Davis in the third round in one minute and 45 seconds. Both boys were good but Bronson's rights were too heavy for the Oregon City lad. Bronson weighed 127 while Davis at 125.

The third go was a good fight between Scott Holland, of Portland, and Rudy Stanard, Wyoming. Holland took the last round of the go and a decision over Stanard. Stanard's eye was opened in the third, and proved to be a big hindrance.

The semi windup was between Clark of Portland and Farrar of Salem. This go lasted but one frame with Clark scoring a knock out. The fight ended after one minute and 35 seconds. Clark tipped the scales at 125 and Farrar matched him.
