SOME SUNDAY SERMONS FROM SALEM PULPITS

"GOD'S RAINBOW"

Genesis 9:1-17

Sermon by Dr. N. K. Tully, First Presbyterian church. The old Hebrew looked upon the rainbow and said: "God made it." That is still the conclusion of the unspoiled mind. There are no marks of man upon it. To the Hebrew the rainbow expressed God's friendly interest in men, his goodness, and his mercy. In spite of all contrary appearances there is a heart of love at the center of the universe, for the bow in the heavens in God's smile after the storm.

The modern man notes the universality of the rainbow; it is common to all peoples, climes, and times, whereas other wonders of nature are localized. So is God's goodness over all. The rainbow is immense, a symbol of God's great thoughts and large ideas. It is of incalculable antiquity; the race's first picture book, its oldest catechism, its primordial scripture. The rainbow is intermittent; it comes and goes. Before its splendor has become commonplace it has vanished. So also are our most delicate and lovely blessings. God lets us have them a little at a time in order that we may not lose our appreciation of them.
