

CHERRY GROWERS MEET ON TUESDAY

Two County Organizations
to Be Formed to Fight
Maggot Danger

A meeting of the cherry growers of Marion and Polk counties will be held next Tuesday evening at 8 o'clock in the auditorium of the Salem chamber of commerce.

At that time an organized attempt to control the cherry fruit fly or maggot will be formed in the two counties. The entire Willamette valley is infested for this purpose.

It is said that no cannery in his district will accept cherries that have not been sprayed. It is the object of the meeting to bring out the proper method of spraying. Some cherry men hold that improper spraying will ruin the market for Oregon cherries.

Prof. Clayton L. Long horticultural specialist of OAC and W. L. Teutsch, district representative of the extension of the same school, will be present and will explain the problem of the maggots and how it should be met.

Because of the fact that the cherry crop will only be about 50 per cent this year, cherry growers are warned to see that what cherries they do produce are quality cherries.

DEATH FACES FISH BIRTH TO FRYPAN

Expedition of Naturalists Investigates How Herring Gets to Table

KIRK WALL, Orkney Islands.—An expedition of naturalists is investigating from here the great mystery of natural mysteries—how a herring ever gets to the dinner table.

Englishmen are almost reared on herrings. They have them as kippers for breakfast, and then as white bait, (small fish), and pickled, smoked, broiled, or fried. They are always obtainable at even the small restaurants.

Millions of herrings are caught, eaten and relished every year. But scientists know that many more millions rarely ever pass the spawn age, and equal millions never get to adolescence, yet they travel in such numbers that they have been known to top a steamship.

They are the prey of all other fish and human beings from the cradle to the stomach and yet they are the pests of their own world. What the expedition of the Royal Zoological institute wants to solve is the problem of how these creatures from the breakfast lunch and dinner for fish life and home sapiens, and yet are found in such robust numbers.

The expedition has spent two years investigating the habits and trails of the herring in their "alma mater" the Orkney Islands and adjacent wet spaces. The scientists have learned there are enough father and mother herrings to lay billions of spawn each year. This spawn is swarmed by millions of fish, mostly greedy codfish, who fatten and blot themselves on the choice caviar thus provided. The codfish, jelly fish, and many other varieties get their substance for weeks by sucking the herring spawn from rocks and other places in which they nestle.

Despite these marauders, the adhesive eggs survive the incubation period and produce teeming masses of tiny thread like fish. The scientists found other fish

life chasing herring into the beach or any other possible place of safety. At times acres of small herrings were seen, big splashes, accounting for the coalfish and other pursuers, and the little splashes for the escaping herrings.

Man starts the catch while the herrings are in the minnow age, especially called whitebait. What ravishes the sea life makes at this time has not been accurately discovered, but dozens of herrings in various stages were found in cod and mackerel caught by the expedition. Even up to the time when the herring is large enough to stay in a net, the other fish swim about waiting for them to drop over the side of the trawler.

All things work against the herring. It becomes the prey of the trawler more easily than any other fish for the trawler is led directly to the herring shoals by other larger fish.
