

### PRIZES AWARDED AT PEP FESTIVAL

More Than 200 Join in Inspection, Dance and Celebration Here

Approximately 216 persons from Portland were present at an entertainment given Saturday night, under the auspices of the Foreman's Forum, an organization composed of foremen and employees of the PEP company.

Awards in two contests were made Saturday when A. H. Kruehl was given \$25, and Adolph Helgeson \$15, as first and second prize for the best suggestions for improving the Forum.

The second contest was on the basis of efficiency for the past year in construction foreman's work in three departments, electric maintenance construction, line and underground. The seven most important phases of a foreman's work were considered. In electric maintenance construction, Ben Olson took the award, when J. J. Atkins, in the line, and J. G. Van Doozen, in underground were winners.

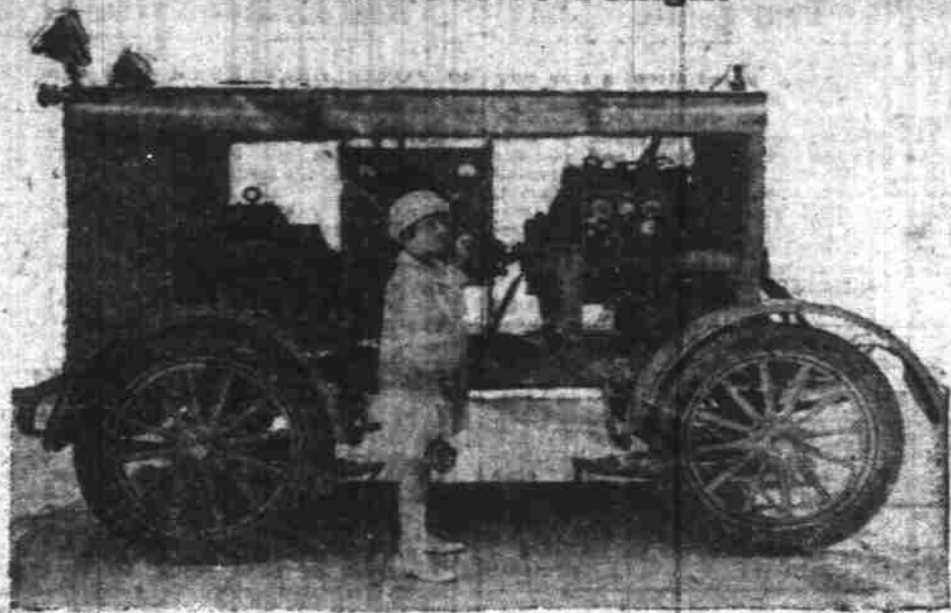
