

# Mickey Walker Loses World Welter Championship Belt to Pete Latzo

## CHALLENGER WINS JUDGES' DECISION

### Furious Ten Round Battle Results in Sensational Upset of Ring Dope

SCRANTON, Penn., May 20.—(By Associated Press.)—Pete Latzo of Scranton, Penn., won the world's welterweight championship tonight when he won the judges' decision in a 10-round match with Mickey Walker, the titleholder for the past four years.

A crowd of 12,000 hometown fans went wild as Latzo's hand was lifted in victory after a sensational slugging battle. The challenger received the unanimous decision of the two judges after a battle that has bitterly fought all the way. Latzo's aggressiveness and ability to trade blows with Walker at every turn gave him the verdict.

The result was one of the most sensational upsets in ring history. Walker had decisively beaten Latzo two years ago and was a two to one favorite when they fought the ring tonight. The challenger weighed 146 and Walker 144.

Latoz's margin of triumph, in the opinion of a majority of ring-side critics, was close and gained chiefly through a determined, two-fisted attack that refused to give ground at any stage, coupled with a deadly overhead right that frequently jarred the champion.

These sweeping smashes of Latzo's, several of which sent Walker flying back to the ropes, counted heavily in his favor and offset, apparently the advantages gained by Walker at close quarters.

A majority of ringside critics gave five of the ten rounds to Latzo, registered three for Walker and scored the other two even.

Latoz's whirlwind finish figured heavily in his victory, overcoming Walker's early advantage, gained through the champion's superiority at boxing and fighting. His attack forced Mickey back repeatedly with smashing rights to the head and body.

### Light by Rounds

Round 1.—They met in the center of the ring for instructions with Referee Frank Floyd of Philadelphia. Latzo led with a right to the ribs and they pounded away at close quarters. Walker worked his left to the jaw as they clinched.

Round 2.—Latoz opened with a short right to the ribs and landed an overhead blow to the chin as they broke away from a duel at close range. Walker landed both fists to the head but Latzo rushed him to the ropes. The champion connected with left to the chin and blocked a right aimed at his own jaw. Walker pounded Latzo severely at close quarters.

Round 3.—Walker swung a right hook to the head, but gave ground as Latzo fought back with both hands. The challenger flailed away with both fists and drove Walker to the ropes. They pounded away lustily to the body in a fierce exchange. Walker's left caught Latzo on the chin but the challenger scored with a sweeping right to the head. Walker dug his right into Latzo's ribs just before the song.

Round 4.—Walker drove his right to Latzo's head, but took a stinging chop to the chin in return. The crowd was in an uproar as they cut loose in a wild exchange, head to head. Walker kept up a heavy fire at Latzo's mid section. The challenger was short and a trifle wild after taking two battering wallops to the jaw. Latzo brought the crowd to its feet with a rally that drove the champion to the ropes. Two blows to the head stung the champion just before the bell ended the round.

Round 5.—They lost no time in coming to grips and let fly with both fists. Walker chopped Latzo about the head with short rights, opening a cut under the challenger's left eye. Latzo backed Walker to a corner with a series of fusillade of blows and sent the champion's head back with a long right. They stood toe to toe and traded wallops. Walker stung Latzo with a left hook to the jaw just before the bell.

Round 6.—Latoz caught Walker with a right to the ear but took a stiff jolt to the stomach. Latzo flailed away with both fists as he pushed Walker to the ropes. Both kept boring in and Latzo landed a right to the chin. Walker's left found its mark repeatedly on the challenger's ribs. A stinging right to the head jarred Latzo but he was pounding Walker fiercely about the head when the bell rang. The referee had to separate them.

Round 7.—They lost no time getting in action and banged each other about the body. Latzo then forced the champion back with driving hooks to the ribs and the crowd roared. There were boos

as Walker clipped his rival on the back. Latzo was forcing the battle but found Walker's defense hard to penetrate. Walker's left connected to the jaw as they were jockeyed head to head. The round ended with the crowd giving Latzo a big ovation.

Round 8.—Latoz plugged Walker about the head but took a battering on the ribs in return. Walker dug his right to the body while his left found Latzo's chin. The challenger sent Walker's head back with a straight left and took a series of pabs on the jaw in return. The referee was busy prying them apart. Both landed lefts to the head and Latzo caught the champion on the ear with a stiff right. They were sparring at the bell.

Round 9.—Walker opened with a rush and pounded the challenger about the head. Latzo worked his right to the body but was backed off with a flurry of choppy wallops to the head. The champion missed twice with his left and they came to a clinch. They leaned their heads together and traded uppercuts to the chin. Latzo's left connected sharply to the jaw. Walker's left connected with Latzo's head just before the bell.

Round 10.—They came together with a rush. Both flailed away to head with both fists. Latzo sent the champion to the ropes with a smashing right and sent his head back with a left uppercut. Walker chopped with his right to the head and hooked a left to the jaw. They fought like a pair of bulldogs with neither giving ground. Walker smashed his right to the ear. Two stiff lefts to the head jarred Latzo but he came back to pound Walker's ribs. Two overhead rights caught Walker on the side of the head. Both punched away with all they had as the final bell sounded, amid a bedlam of noise.
