

Georges Carpenter, French Battler, Fights Draw With Eddie Huffman

BRILLIANT FIGHT IS MADE BY BOTH MEN

14,000 Spectators Voice General Approval When 10 Rounds Ends Draw

NEW YORK, May 21.—(By Associated Press.)—Georges Carpenter, soldier-fighter from France and Eddie Huffman, blonde Californian, fought a 10-round draw at Madison Square Garden tonight in which both fighters showed plenty of action from the start with general approval from the 14,000 spectators.

The Frenchman appeared to have an edge during the opening rounds but he tired and Huffman came back strong in the ninth and tenth to get an even break. Huffman did his best work at close quarters. Huffman weighed 175½ and the Frenchman two pounds less.

ROUND ONE: Carpenter started the first punch, a left which was short. The jabbing lefts sent Huffman's head back and the Californian gave ground. A swinging right landed on Car-

pentier's face and he dropped to his knee, but he was up immediately. A knifing right to the jaw staggered Huffman. A left sent Huffman to the ropes. The Frenchman was outboxing his opponent. Carpenter spun Huffman around with a right as the bell rang.

ROUND TWO: They danced around cautiously, neither willing to open up. Huffman staggered Carpenter with a clubbing right to the head. Two lefts and a right to the head forced Huffman to clinch. At close quarters they hammered away at the body. Carpenter walked into a straight left to the jaw but missed his right counter. The bell found them dancing.

ROUND THREE: An uppercut forced the Frenchman to clinch and both landed damaging blows to the body. A left jarred Huffman's head. Huffman staggered Georges with a left to the face but failed to follow up. Huffman drove a vicious right to the body and Carpenter doubled up. They lashed away openly with both hands. They were locked at the bell.

ROUND FOUR: The Frenchman leaped in but caught Huffman's right uppercut which almost lifted him off his feet. Huffman was warned for hitting in the breaks. A well timed left named Huffman half around. He wavered but did not fall. Another right staggered him and he reeled to the ropes. The Frenchman leaped in, missed with his right and fell flat to the canvas just before the bell.

ROUND FIVE: They exchanged lefts to the head. Two solid rights to the head staggered Huffman. Another right landed flush to the Californian's jaw and he rushed in madly. The Californian had no defense for Carpenter's flashing right. Again Huffman caught Carpenter near the ropes and poured both hands to the head and body but the bell interrupted the skirmish.

ROUND SIX: Carpenter came

up furiously. Huffman tore in but the Frenchman peddled away. Two rights to the body slowed Carpenter. Huffman came in openly and Carpenter planted a right to the face and the westerner backed up. The Frenchman seemed to lose his snap as Huffman's punches landed more frequently. They were sparring at the bell.

ROUND SEVEN: They sparred for a minute without landing a blow. Two savage rights narrowly missed Huffman's head. The action slowed as Carpenter tired and Huffman refused to assume the aggressive. Huffman staggered Carpenter with a right to the head just as the bell rang, but they continued to fight until the referee parted them. It was a tame round until the end.

ROUND EIGHT: The Frenchman stunned Huffman with three straight rights to the head. Huffman landed to the body. They exchanged lefts to the face. The Frenchman brought blood to Huffman's mouth with a lightning left. Huffman sent Carp's head back with a left. They were in a clinch at the bell.

ROUND NINE: Huffman speeded up and drove Carpenter to the ropes with a right to the head and left to the body. A flashing right to the face caught Huffman coming in. Another right almost knocked him over but he clutched Carpenter to save himself. Both landed to the head with terrific rights but they came back smiling. Huffman sent Carpenter half way across the ring with a right to the head. Another right to the head staggered Carpenter just before the bell.

ROUND TEN: Huffman poured both fists at Carpenter's body at close range. Huffman tore in, landing to the head and body without an exchange. They lashed at each other openly, landing damaging blows with honours even. They both missed right leads. Huffman staggered Carpenter with a right uppercut. They were fighting frantically at the bell.
