CHICAGO.—(By Associated Press.)—A penny a day comes from the pocket of the average American to buy peanuts, gum, or some similar confection from a vending machine.

Somewhere near a million dollars a day, mostly in pennies, is pushed through narrow slots into vending devices. The machine which vends its wares for one cent almost invariably takes in larger receipts than a machine operated by a nickel, a dime or some larger coin.

There is a slot machine to every ten persons in the United States, and the ratio may be even smaller.


