

Jack Dempsey is to Defend World Heavyweight Title on September 16

CHAMP'S OPPONENT SOUGHT BY RICKARD

Heavyweight Battle Assured by Signing of Articles at Hot Springs Today

HOT SPRINGS, Ark., May 28.—(By Associated Press.)—Jack Dempsey will defend his heavyweight title on the night of September 16.

That announcement was made tonight by Tex Rickard to the Associated Press.

Dempsey accompanied by a large party that had been with him in Hendersonville, N. C., arrived in Hot Springs this morning for a conference with Rickard which was held this afternoon.

"Dempsey and I have agreed as to who his opponent will be," Rickard said, "and the date of the bout will be on the night of September 16. I cannot, however, at this time, state who Dempsey will defend his title against. I will make that fact public when I appear before the New York state boxing commission next Wednesday."

There was a persistent rumor current that the man agreed upon was Gene Tunney, but neither Dempsey nor Rickard would either affirm or deny that it was the Greenwich Village idol. In fact Dempsey left all public statements to Rickard.

"I was delighted to find Dempsey in such fine shape," said Rickard. "His stay in Hendersonville proved that he had really worked hard. He will have very little weight to take off. When I first saw him, I thought he had gotten a little thin."

"Dempsey will pass July and August in Colorado Springs, and will come to New York in September to finish his training. I had hoped he would remain here for at least two weeks for the baths, but he has an engagement in Cleveland Monday night, which concludes, he informed me, his public exhibition and from there he goes to Colorado."

Rickard indicated that he believed the opponent he and Dempsey had agreed upon would meet with popular approval and that as great an interest in the coming world's heavyweight championship fight would be aroused as was the case when Dempsey fought Carpenter.

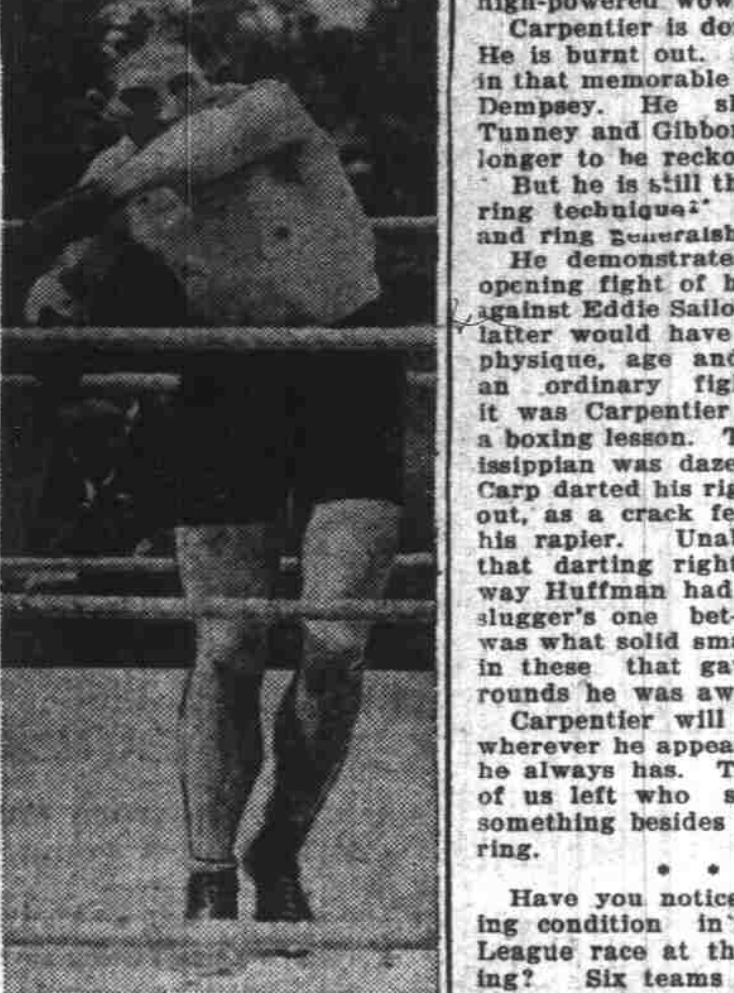
GOLF FINALS TODAY

Speaking of boxing, or were we? Georges Carpenter has started his "final tour and last appearance" in America. And he bids fair to make it one of the greatest object lessons ever offered American fighters.

He is going to show, in 10 and 12 round lessons, how science can battle brute strength, youth and a high-powered wow.

Carpenter is done as a fighter. He is burnt out. He shot his all in that memorable fight with Jack Dempsey. He showed against Tunney and Gibbons that he is no longer to be reckoned with.

But he is still the old master in ring technique—boxing science, and ring generalship.

He demonstrated that in the opening fight of his present visit against Eddie Sailor Huffman. The latter would have battered down physique, age and stamina. As an ordinary fighter of Carp's it was Carpenter gave Huffman a boxing lesson. The young Mississippi was dazed by the way Carp darted his right hand in and out, as a crack fencer does with his rapier. Unable to get past that darting right in any other way Huffman had to rely on the slugger's one bet—rushing. It was what solid smashes he landed in these that gave him what rounds he was awarded.

Carpenter will draw a crowd wherever he appears this trip—as he always has. There are a few of us left who still like to see something besides murder in the ring.

Have you noticed the interesting condition in the American League race at the present writing? Six teams in the circuit boast winning averages—or did up to the last game or two. TRACK TEAMS HERE FOR ANNUAL EVENTS

Conference Meeting to Precede Afternoon Program of Sports at Willamette

Every team in the northwest conference will be represented in the conference track meet, to be held this afternoon at 2 o'clock on Sweetland field. The three teams that had to travel from a distance arrived last night. They are the College of Puget Sound, Whitman university, and College of Idaho. The teams from Linfield college and Pacific university will arrive this morning.

At 9 o'clock there will be a conference meeting, at which all the coaches and the faculty representatives will be present. It is also probable that the football schedule will be arranged at that time.

Close competition is expected in each event. Willamette, Linfield and Pacific are evenly matched, Willamette having defeated both schools in recent meets by one point each.

Because of the recent rains it was not possible to proceed with the widening of the tracks. The result is that preliminaries for the 220-yard dash and 220-yard hurdles will have to be held. These will probably be held at 1:30 o'clock.

Plans have been worked out faithfully so that the meet should prove well organized. It is estimated that the last event will be over shortly after 4 o'clock.

All records made today will be official and will establish the conference records, as this is the first conference meet since reorganization of the northwest conference.

Coaches are Rathbun of Willamette; Borleske of Whitman; Hart of College of Idaho; Seward of CPS; Frank of Pacific, and Pettit of Linfield.

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WRESTLERS AWAIT REFEREES SIGNAL

Reynolds and Reed Said to Be in Prime Condition for Clash at Albany

PORTLAND, May 28.—(By Associated Press.)—Jack Reynolds, welterweight wrestling champion, arrived here today from the east on his way to Albany where he will meet Robin Reed, OAC wrestling coach, in a title match tomorrow night. A purse of \$2500 has been raised by Albany business men for the event.

ALBANY, Or., May 28.—Judging from reports reaching here from the east regarding Jack Reynolds' type of wrestling, those who see Reynolds and Robin Reed clash at Bryant park arena here Saturday night should witness a Greek vs. Greek classic, though neither of the gladiators is a Greek in more than the figurative sense.

According to eastern sports writers Reynolds depends upon speed, endurance and skill for his wins, and has seldom lost. When he has lost he has always retrieved.

Though Reed has been a professional wrestler for less than two years he has built up a similar reputation here. He has lost but two matches since entering the professional game, and both of those were to Henry Jones of Provo, Utah, believed here to be the peer of all wrestlers excepting Koed.

And Reed retrieved each one of those losses, defeating Jones in their last match, and thus claiming the right to the western welterweight title.

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
