COAST CITIES SHOW INCREASED GROWTH

Substantial Gains in Building Records Are Shown by Straus Reports

Although 44 of the 95 Pacific coast cities comprised in the national monthly building survey of S. W. Straus & Co. report substantial gains in the April building records, the coast area, as a whole, issued 11 per cent less in building permits during last month than in April of last year, and show a reduction of 1 per cent from the comparable figure for March of this year.

In California, 24 of the 58 cities included show gains, including San Francisco, San Diego, Sacramento, Pasadena, Glendale, Bakersfield, San Jose, Stockton, San Bernardino, Santa Monica, Santa Cruz, Modesto and Ventura. San Francisco, although experiencing some embarrassment from a carpenters' strike, achieved the highest monthly record in its history. Lewiston, Idaho, and Salem, Or., also established new high records.

Vancouver, B. C., also slightly disturbed by labor difficulties, issued 80 per cent more in building permits during April than in March and 52 per cent more than in April of last year. The total was \$1,451,050. The total for the Vancouver metropolitan area was \$2,516,805, a 38 per cent increase over the comparable figure for 1923.

San Francisco issued \$7,299,451 in building permits during April, 85 per cent above the March record and 19 per cent above that of last April. It is the highest monthly total, since the days of reconstruction after the fire except for January of 1914, when this figure was surpassed by \$40,000 because of \$6,000,000 of Panama-Pacific exposition building permits.

The 13 municipalities of the San Francisco bay area report an April total of \$11,419,967, 6 per cent less than for last April, but 34 per cent above the March figure of this year.

Los Angeles issued \$11,207,289 in April building permits, a reduction of 22 per cent from last April's record and 19 per cent less than in March. In the Los Angeles metropolitan area, 15 municipalities issued \$16,472,617 in building permits during April, showing reductions of 14 per cent and 12 per cent, respectively, from the figures of last April and March of 1923.

Portland holds third place in the Pacific coast list for April, with a total of \$3,176,370, which is 14 per cent less than the March figure and 6 per cent below that of last April.

Seattle's \$2,534,130 in building permits issued during April takes fourth place among the Pacific coast cities, but shows a 54 per cent reduction from the April figures of last year and a 12 per cent reduction from those of March of this year.

Oakland, with an April total of \$2,134,179 in building permits issued, reports a 7 per cent reduction from the March figure and one of 39 per cent from the total of last April.

San Diego's April record of \$1,596,560 in building permits issued is 22 per cent below the March figure, but 3 per cent above that of last April.

Sacramento issued \$1,329,576 in building permits during April, 52 per cent more than in March and 88 per cent more than in April, 1923.

Pasadena's record of \$948,829 in April building permits is 31 per cent above the March figure

and 5 per cent above that of April of last year.

Glendale issued \$979,323 in building permits during April, a 3 per cent gain over March and a gain of 14 per cent over last April's figure.

San Jose issued \$611,730 in building permits during April, 53 per cent more than for March and 94 per cent more than the April figure of 1923.

Salt Lake City, with an April total of \$223,015, shows a 2 per cent reduction from the March figure and a 4 per cent reduction from that of April, 1923.

Tacoma, issuing \$817,125 in April building permits, shows a 15 per cent reduction from last April's figure, but a 20 per cent gain over March of this year.

Spokane's April figure of \$394,128 in building permits, is 12 per cent below the March total and 17 per cent below that of last April. Longview gained 21 per cent over March and 81 per cent over last April with an April total of \$291,775 in building permits issued last month.

Burnaby, in the Vancouver, B. C., area, gained 22 per cent over March and 113 per cent over last April with an April total of \$133,510 in building permits.

Ogden's \$183,250 in April building permits is 2 per cent above the March figure and is 31 per cent greater than the April record of 1923.

Beverly Hills issued 123 permits calling for a total cost of \$763,459 during April, 23 per cent below April of last year, but 3 per cent above the March total.

Berkeley's April total of 254 permits costing \$642,100 shows decreases of 23 per cent and 29 per cent, respectively, below April of 1923 and March of this year.

In Long Beach a deferred decision on an oil zoning regulation has interfered with normal building progress, reducing the April total of building permits issued to \$490,190, 66 per cent below the March figure and 35 per cent below that of last April.

Bakersfield, with an April total of 91 permits to cost \$183,031, shows a gain of 72 per cent above April of 1923 and 12 per cent above March of 1924.

Alameda issued 34 permits to cost \$185,204 during April. This figure shows gains of 12 per cent and 5 per cent, respectively, over the April, 1923, figures and the March, 1924, figures.

Lewiston's \$141,290 in April building permits is 16 per cent above the March figure and 203 per cent above that of last April and is the highest monthly record in its history.

San Bernardino gained 5 per cent over the March figure and 15 per cent over that of last April with an April total of \$319,132 in building permits issued.

Santa Monica issued \$1,444,220 in building permits during April, the highest monthly figure since December of 1924. It is 145 per cent above the March figure and 52 per cent above that of last April.

Whittier, with an April total of \$115,280 in building permits, gained 62 per cent over the March figure and 172 per cent over that of last April.

Thoson gained 52 per cent over

the March figure and 45 per cent over that of last April with a total of \$138,389 in building permits issued.

Salem achieved a new high record for building activity with an April total of \$561,375 in building permits, 146 per cent above the March figure and 108 per cent above that of last April.

GALE WRECKS BUILDINGS

SEVERE STORM SWEEPING OVER STATE OF OKLAHOMA

OKLAHOMA CITY, Okla., May 31.—(By Associated Press.)—Three buildings and a number of houses were destroyed in a storm which struck the town of Muldrow in Eastern Oklahoma tonight reports received here said.

Meager advices did not tell of the extent of the property damage nor was it known whether any one had been killed.

Telephone and telegraph communication was impaired. The storm was reported sweeping westward over the state.

FINAL ROMANCE OF THE INDIAN SHOW

"The Vanishing American" at the New Elsinore, is Real Epic of West

Their retreat into the desert fastness is marked by a trail of blood.

This portion of the story of the western hemisphere's first citizens is included in "The Vanishing American," filmed by Paramount from the story by Zane Grey on the Navajo Indian reservation, 165 miles from a railroad.

This epic of the American Indian, written in the sincere, direct dramatic manner that characterizes all of Zane Grey's works, not gloss over the transgressions of the white man against the red. George B. Seitz who was entrusted with the directing of the picture, has followed the story faithfully, both in letter and spirit.

The bitter, courageous, determined but hopeless stand of the Indians against their white enemies, their retreat from the green fields and well watered country they had called their home for centuries into the barren desert wastes is a powerful episode of "The Vanishing American," which is so wailing at the Elsinore.

At the head of a company of 500 persons, Seitz established a base camp at Kayenta, on the Navajo reservation in northeastern Arizona, and remained there approximately four months. Richard Dix, Lois Wilson, Noah Berry and Malcolm McGregor are the featured players.
