

DEMPSEY TOLD TO SIGN FOR BATTLE

New York Boxing Commission Issues Ultimatum to World Champ

NEW YORK, June 1.—(By Associated Press.)—Exercising its prerogative as the supreme court of boxing in New York, the state athletic commission today directed Jack Dempsey to sign articles of agreement for a title fight with Harry Wills not later than June 22nd.

With Commissioner Brower, the only absentee, the board passed, by a unanimous vote, the following resolution:

"In that Jack Dempsey on July 17, 1925, accepted the challenge of Harry Wills to box for the heavyweight championship of the world, the commission now feels that ample time has elapsed for signing articles and hereby directs Jack Dempsey to enter into proper articles of agreement with the challenger not later than June 22, 1926." The resolution was mailed to Dempsey tonight.

Asked to explain the board's action, Chairman Farley said it was intended to "clear the atmosphere."

Boxing observers, however, looked upon it as a further complication in the situation with Tex Rickard holding Dempsey's contract and presumably moving toward his objective, a title match between Dempsey and Gene Tunney on September 16 at the Yankee stadium. The commission, however, Farley said, will "not listen" to proposals for a Dempsey-Tunney contest. Observers agree, however, that only two courses are open to Dempsey and Rickard.

(1)—For Dempsey to ignore the issue, have the commission declare his title removed and transferred to Wills, then, as a "challenger" to battle Tunney under Rickard's promotion.

(2)—For Rickard to accept the order and announce his willingness to promote a Dempsey-Wills fight if sanctioned and freed of all interference. Opposition by public authorities to a "mixed match" for the heavyweight title is understood to have been the chief stumbling block to bringing Wills and Dempsey together before and it is not believed this has been removed in spite of the commission's attitude.

Rickard, who already has announced he has selected an opponent for Dempsey, is expected to return to New York tomorrow from Hot Springs, Ark., and confer with the commission on Thursday.

Dempsey's contract with Rickard calls for a bout with any opponent named by the promoter.

AUTO DRIVERS FACE SHORTAGE OF TIRES

SURVEY SHOWS 9,000,000 IN HANDS OF DEALERS

Speeding Up of Factories Necessary to Meet Demand of Motor Owners

AKRON, Ohio, June 1.—(By Associated Press.)—A tire shortage of 7,000,000 units faces American motorists, William O'Neill, president of the General tire and rubber company declared today.

O'Neill's statement follows a nationwide survey which shows, he said, only 9,000,000 tires in the hands of the dealers.

"Past experience of the manufacturers shows the nation's dealers now should have on hand 16,000,000 tires," O'Neill said.

The immediate result of the shortage, he indicated would be a speeding up in tire factories.
