OMNIBUS BILL PASSES BY SUBSTANTIAL VOTE

senate before adjournment. House debate on the measure, which centered about the Illinois river project on the contention that it involved the question of water diversion from Lake Michigan, was confined largely to dilatory tactics on parliamentary points of procedure in the attempt by opponents of diversion to block final action at this session of congress.

Last minute attempts to eliminate the most controversial provisions failed as a well defined majority roared its opposition to proposed changes.

Those bent on keeping the bill intact followed each victory with cries of "vote, vote," in an attempt to speed up final action on the measure over which a disorderly membership wrangled yesterday continuously for 14 hours, adjourned after 1 o'clock this morning, with a vote in view.

The Illinois proposal calls for an expenditure of \$1,350,000 for providing a nine-foot channel in the Illinois river between Utica and Grafton, Ill., and removal of old government locks and dams, completing a waterway link between the Great Lakes and the Gulf of Mexico. A committee amendment specified that nothing in the bill shall be interpreted to affect the question of water diversion. At the present time, withdrawal of \$250 cubic feet a second is allowed under a permit from the secretary of war.

Re-survey of the proposed all-American canal route by army engineers is proposed, with no spe-

cific expenditure authorized for this purpose. An amendment by Representative Ellis, republican, Missouri, provides for approval of an army engineer's report made 18 years ago on the advisability of providing a six-foot channel in the Missouri river between Kansas City, Mo., and Sioux City, Iowa, a distance of 109 miles. After the engineers had submitted a report covering the entire Missouri river survey, congress appropriated for development of the channel from the mouth of the river to Kansas City, but not beyond.

Some opponents of the project, which calls for no expenditure at present, estimated that it would cost \$56,000,000 for completion, twice the amount estimated by engineers 15 years ago.

The bill approved today also would authorize more than 120 surveys of rivers and harbors with a view to navigation, waterpower, flood control or irrigation improvements.

Party lines were regarded on the vote, representatives from the Mississippi valley, the south, Illinois and New England generally supporting it, while those from states bordering on the Great Lakes for the most part lined up against it.

bureau is legally incorporated, and its directors have laid the plan quite generally before those engaged in the lumber industry.

Information on Pacific coast lumber is lacking, he added and if Douglas fir is to reach an equal basis with building woods produced by other associations, time, money and energy must be devoted by members of the West Coast association. The bureau contemplates constant contact with retail dealers and publicity will be an important part of the campaign.

Everett Griggs of the St. Paul and Tacoma Lumber company, Tacoma, Wash., declared there was a demand on the Atlantic coast for Pacific coast lumber, 1,500,000,000 feet having been shipped there last year, but that something must be done to adjust prices. "We don't want to give our lumber away, for it is the best soft wood in existence," he said.

Colonel Griggs urged that operators occasionally break away from their mills and get in contact with eastern markets.

Standards for Pacific coast lumber were set when the association adopted resolutions which provide that grades more than six inches thick be the same as those of the American standards, which were changed at the American Lumber Standardization conference in Washington, D. C., to conform to West Coast standards. Hereafter the standard for finish will be 25-32 inch instead of one inch and for siding 3-4 inch instead of 1-16 inch. In adopting these changes the west coast standards became 100 per cent American standards. This met the unanimous approval of the 150 members of the association in attendance.

H. N. Froebel, Seattle, traffic manager of the West Coast association submitted his report of the survey he made relative to the proposal for a lower rail rate to the Atlantic coast to compete with the water rate, that of 72 cents a hundred pounds, instead of 90 cents, as at present for a minimum carload to 70,000 pounds. This was referred to a traffic committee.

BAYOCEAN TO BE PUT ON MAP AGAIN

This Item Will Interest Many Lot Owners in This Part of the State

(The following news item from the Oregonian of Thursday will interest a good many lot owners in this part of Oregon.)

Litigation that has clouded the affairs of the Potter Land company at Bayocean, Tillamook county for the last 15 years, was cleared up yesterday when Circuit Judge Tucker signed an order accepting the conditional offer of M. D. Ackley and other residents of Tillamook county to take over the Potter company assets.

The order makes it incumbent upon the purchasers first of all to complete construction of a good rock or gravel highway on the property, so that lot owners who have struggled along for so long without any return on their investment may at least have a means of easy access to their property. The road work is to be completed by April 1, 1927.

The order also provides that the purchasers must spend approximately 100,000\$ in general improvements and in straightening out the affairs of the defunct Potter company.

At the hearing before Judge Tucker and Judge Hewitt, F. D. Mitchell, a lot owner, also representing other lot owners opposed the transfer of the assets of the Potter company, but the court held that such transfer, with conditions imposed, was for the best interests of the majority of those concerned.

obey the submitted price schedule, refusal to buy or sell to any retailer or wholesaler who was not a member of the association, preventing carload lots being purchased by non-members, circulating lists of prices among themselves, fining members who did not observe regulations, "imposing social and other penalties" upon persons, firms and corporations who refused to adhere to any of the prices, practices and policies agreed upon.

The decision in the case of the grocers' association is the first to be handed down, although a great many similar actions are pending in the various federal courts of the Pacific northwest, the result of activities several years ago under a department since wiped out by anti-trust regulation.
