RIDES ROUGH-SHOD OVER COLLEGE EDUCATION

GRAND FORKS, N. D.—Alexander Facey, 38, a South Dakota rancher, living in the treeless areas north of the Black Hills, has a degree of science from the University of North Dakota after less than one year's residence work.



When Facey appeared on the campus one month late last fall he had no credits to show either from college or high school and yet proposed to receive a college degree at the end of the year. He said preliminary skirmishing of college authorities and after many age-old precedents had been smashed, the man was allowed to enter as a special student with the privilege of taking special examinations every two weeks.
