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Marines, Led By Tunney, Flock to Squared Circle and Win Fistic Fame MAXWELL

Gene Tunney, who has his eye on the World's Championship, and three other Marine scrappers, whose names are known to fight fans.

Boxing is rapidly becoming the leading sport of the U. S. Marines. Leather pushing has always been a lure to the leathernecks, but never in the history of the organization have there been so many marines in the ring.

The dauntless Gene Tunney did much to stimulate the marines to greater fistic effort. Gene was with the marines in France, won the light-heavyweight championship of the A. E. F., and then punched his way via Carpentier, Greb and Gibbons to the front rank of the heavies.

Inspired by his example scores of marines and ex-marines are attempting to follow in the footsteps of the illustrious Gene.

Corporal Walter S. Vance, for example, donned the gloves for the first time when he enlisted at Paris Island, S. C., several months ago. Vance whipped all of his buddies in the lightweight class, then stepped out and defeated seventeen other aspiring boxers in the neighborhood of Savannah, Ga.

He is now with the marines in Philadelphia. His additional earnings are used to send a younger sister through school.

Private George D. Verner is the middleweight champion of the Corps. Verner won a dozen or more bouts in Chicago before he reached Paris Island. One of his first triumphs in the South was the defeat of Ken Barth, champion of the Carolinas. He also defeated Frankie Grant, former champion of the Navy. Jimmy Conway, who had bested the redoubtable Jack Britton, and many others. Verner is at Lakeland, N. J., seeking fresh fistic honors.

Ray Maxwell is another hard-hitting welterweight, who learned to wield the padded mitts in the Marine Corps. Maxwell was stationed with the marines in the West Indies.

While there he met and defeated all comers at his weight. A year ago he laid aside his marine uniform and turned professional, fighting in several eastern cities.

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LUDENDORFF BEING SUED FOR DIVORCE

Germany's Wartime Leader Is Charged With Neglect Towards Wife

BERLIN, June 7.—(By Associated Press.)—Frau Ludendorff, wife of General Erich Ludendorff, Germany's war time quartermaster general and leader of the ultra nationalists, has brought suit for divorce. She gives as the ground for her action that the general's many political activities have caused him to neglect her.

The suit has been entered in the Munich courts and will be heard on Friday in camera, according to German custom.

Despite the official secrecy surrounding Frau Ludendorff's divorce suit, it is learned that she charges cruelty.

General Ludendorff's activities as leader of the German fascists, her petition filed at Munich says, "made him extremely irritable," and increasing abuse "so as to make life unbearable."

Frau Ludendorff is sick and receiving treatment at a sanitarium near Munich.

General Ludendorff has refused to make a statement, saying: "It is no business of the press."

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
