The city recorder was instructed to pay the fee of \$10 to the state for inspection of the Salem auto camp.

Remonstrances against the paving of Nebraska from Fifteenth to Twentieth streets and Fairgrounds Road from Hood to Summer were referred to the city engineer.

A report of the election canvassing committee was read.

Mrs. Ray L. Tracy is claiming \$100 damages against the city for injuries alleged to have been received as the result of a street improvement project at which no red lantern for warning had been placed.

Another attempt to raise the pay of the street commissioner is apparent in the reading last night for the first time of an ordinance fixing such pay. It is understood that the present ordinance provides that the pay start now, instead of the first of the year.

R. R. Ryan's barn has a rotten foundation and should be torn down. This is the opinion of the city engineer as told the council last night. The city recorder was instructed to notify Mr. Ryan to tear down his barn.

31 FACING NEW CHARGE

INDICTMENTS ARE RETURNED BY FEDERAL GRAND JURY

SEATTLE, June 7.—(By Associated Press.)—It was learned here tonight that 31 persons were indicted by a federal grand jury in Tacoma, Wash., Saturday in connection with operations of the defunct Ruby Beach Mining company of Aberdeen, Wash. by which nearly 1000 investors were said to have been swindled out of \$300,000. Conspiracy to use the mails to defraud is the charge.

United States Marshal Benn arrested R. G. Lane, president of the company; John H. Epton, a former president; A. R. Everson and A. R. Hillard, all of Aberdeen here today and Alan C. Pearson, a Seattle salesman.

In Bellingham Deputy Marshal Joseph Knizek arrested Wesley Brooks, Charles De White, Albert W. Curtiss and Carl B. Riddell, stock salesmen of that city and Major S. Brooks of Ferndale, Wash.

The company was said to have discovered a process for extracting gold from sand. Its advertised field of operation was on a beach north of Aberdeen.

Officials here intimated that arrests would include citizens of southwest Washington towns.
