PRINCETON BEATEN BY WASHINGTON MEN

Northwest Crew Scores a Smashing Victory Over Eastern Shell Team

PRINCETON, N. J., June 18. (By Associated Press.)—The University of Washington's powerful varsity crews outstanding contenders for this year's intercollegiate championship honors scored two smashing triumphs over Princeton today in the first intercollegiate regatta on Lake Carnegie in five years. Washington's varsity combination, a giant boatload averaging around 6 feet, 3 inches in height, won from the Tigers by six lengths after the far westerners' junior varsity shell had crossed the finish line close to ten lengths in front of their Princeton rivals. Both races were rowed over a course of one and three quarter miles.

The regatta marked the first eastern competitive test of 1926 for the Huskies, champions of the Pacific coast, and the convincing manner of their victories, plus the smoothly powerful exhibition of oarsmanship they displayed, boosted their already well regarded chances of triumph in the championship races at Poughkeepsie, N. Y., June 28. The element of competition vanished from each of today's races, rowed under ideal conditions in a picturesque setting, before they were fairly under way. Neither of the Tiger crews was a match for their sturdier, more experienced rivals and after the half mile point had been passed in each event it was simply a question of how big an advantage the Huskies would run up.

Princeton got the better of the start in each race, particularly in the junior race, but was unable to hold its advantage much of the way. In the junior varsity contest Washington overtook and passed

TIGER FLOWERS IS VICTOR IN BATTLE

Young Bob Fitzsimmons Is Given Lessons by World's Middleweight Champ

JERSEY CITY, N. J., June 18. (By Associated Press.)—Tiger Flowers of Georgia, world's middleweight champion, toyed with Young Bob Fitzsimmons, son of the former heavyweight champion, in a 10-round contest at Boyle's Thirty Acres tonight. Flowers stepped out of his class, conceding 17½ pounds to the son of Fighting Bob and then gave the heavyweight a scientific demonstration of all the finer points of the art.

With Jim Jeffries, former world's heavyweight champion and Tom Sharkey, a contemporary of Jeffries sitting in ringside seats, Flowers administered a severe drubbing to Fitzsimmons, outboxing and outpointing him throughout. Both of Fitzsimmons eyes were cut.

Fitzsimmons weighed 184 and Flowers 166½ pounds. Newspapersmen at the ringside were unanimous in giving the champion every round.

KEMAL ESCAPES DEATH

CONSPIRATORS ATTEMPT TO ASSASSINATE PRESIDENT

CONSTANTINOPLE, June 18. (By Associated Press.)—Mustapha Kemal Pasha, president of Turkey, narrowly escaped death at the hands of plotters on his arrival at Smyrna today, for just before he came into the city the authorities learned of the conspiracy. A number of persons were arrested, among them two prominent Turks, the police seized weapons and bombs. A special Smyrna and begun preliminary tribunal already has reached

investigations. The government announces the conspirators have confessed. Zia Hourchid, one of the men taken into custody, is a leader in the territory bordering on the Black Sea which is the center of the strongest opposition to President Kemal and where the movement against modernist reforms in Turkey began last year.
