

St. Johns, Eager to Check Salem, Plans on Upsetting Dope Today

LEADERS' RIVALRY TURNS ON CONTEST

Win for Salem and Defeat for Cyclops, Would bring Tie in League.

Although St. Johns is footing the list in the Greater Portland-Willamette Valley league race, Buddy Bishop, manager of the Salem Senators is expecting a battle this afternoon when the two teams meet at Oxford park at 3 o'clock.

At the recent meeting of heads of the league here Shaw, head of the St. Johns boys, expressed resentment at Bishop's attitude toward the idea of splitting the season to give the lower clubs a new lease on life. The threat was made that when the St. Johns boys should come for today's game, they will try to bring along the means to upset the dope and slip Salem back a game.

With the race neck and neck between the Senators and the Portland Cyclops, a loss for Salem today and a win for the Cyclops would seriously mar Salem's chances to come out at the head in the pennant race.

On the other hand, should the Cyclops be defeated at Albany this afternoon, and should the Senators succeed in trouncing the St. Johns boys, the local team would be tied with the Cyclops. There are still two rounds to go after today's contests.

Earle Sande, Premier Jockey, Rides Haste to a Thrilling Victory

SALEM BOY SCORES IN FLEET COMPANY

Baggenbagg and Boot-to-Boot Go Down to Defeat in Fairmont Derby

COLLINGSVILLE, Ill., June 19.—(By Associated Press.)—The fleetness of foot of J. E. Widener's Haste and the skillful riding of Jockey Earl Sande of Salem, Or., goes the distinction of breaking the wonderful string of victories of E. R. Bradley's Baggenbagg and Boot-to-Boot. Haste raced to a smashing victory in the \$25,000 Fairmont derby here this afternoon, finishing a short nose ahead of Baggenbagg after a thrilling mile and quarter struggle.

Boot-to-Boot, after surprising the crowd of 20,000 by taking the lead at the start, tired in the killing stretch drive and finished 3rd, closely pressed by Rockman of the Sagamore stable. The time was 2:03 2-5, a new track record. Victorious in two of the biggest features for 3-year-olds this season, the Louisiana and Latonia derbies and second in the Kentucky derby, Baggenbagg was generally conceded the best chance to win, and the Bradley entry was heavily played in the betting.

Early in the back stretch Sande called for speed from Haste, and his mount passed Rockman in a few jumps, but Boot-to-Boot was still leading as they departed from the back stretch. It was on the far turn that Haste made his greatest strides to earn victory, overtaking Boot-to-Boot as they got into the stretch.

Baggenbagg, restrained in the first quarter, was coming with all the speed he had, and it was remarkable speed, too. He passed Rockman and then his stable-mate and finally, with only a 16th remaining, was at the very haunches of Haste.

Sande rode as only Sande knows how to ride, and Haste, like a scared rabbit, set his ears back and ran. Still Baggenbagg came on, and it seemed inevitable he would put his nose in front. But Haste was equal to the call of his rider and maintained his pace just long enough to outlast his galloping nemesis. One jump beyond the finish line Baggenbagg was in front, but Haste had won and the Bradley regime in the three-year-old world had been broken, temporarily at least.

COMPETITION KEEN IN DIAMOND RACE

Beginning Monday night the fans will see some snappy ball in the Twilight and Commercial leagues playing at Oxford park. The previous contests have been improving as the teams got in more practice and more experience. With the season more than half over and any one of six teams within reach of the championship the boys are bound to be pepped up. The Legionnaires, who have held the title for five years are runners up for tail end and are gathering a team to make a fight for the pennant.

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Two Women File as Solons Before Office Legalized

DES MOINES, Iowa.—Undaunted by the fact that the Iowa constitution must first be modified before they can hold office as state representatives, two Iowa women have ventured into the primary election campaign. They have confidence that the voters will approve of change in the constitution in the November election which will make possible the seating of other women candidates

who may be elected on the same date.
Two Iowa legislatures have adopted a resolution striking out the word "male" in the constitutional provision in regard to qualification of persons for legislative positions.

This paved the way for approval by vote.
Women are not barred from other state offices, although candidates have filed only for secretary of state and state superintendent of public instruction—the latter now held by a woman.

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
