Governor Pierce to Address Youngsters; Will Parade to Carnival

Tonight all kiddies that assemble at the store of Harry W. Scott, the little man at 147 South Commercial street, and enter the parade will be guests of the Amherst K. Kluge society. The parade forms promptly at 8:45 and under escort of motorcycle traffic officers, will traverse the principal streets of the city, thence east on Court street to the state capitol where it will be halted while the children are being addressed by Governor Walter M. Pierce, after which it will then proceed out Court street and to the show grounds.

HUGE CROWDS MEET FOR GREAT RELIGIOUS EVENT

Massing which ended the mass thousands of devout poured into the field from the stands and pressed forward through policed ground to the space before the great outdoor altar. Solidly banking the hundred-foot stairway leading to the sanctuary, thousands knelt in prayer before the tabernacle of the eucharist, rendering it impossible to continue with the speaking program which had been arranged to follow the rites of worship.

So intent were the fervent throngs upon approaching as nearly as possible to the altar that the masters of the ceremonies were forced to appeal to the multitudes over the public address system to leave the field at once. In the same manner, a warning was issued that the wooden elevation on which the altar stood was endangered by the thousands which mounted the steps.

The crowds moved out in solemn order, only disappointed that they could not kneel individually before the altar crucifix to pour out their prayerful adoration of the eucharist. More than two hours after the mass ended twenty or thirty thousand people still were in the stands, the already packed stadium, blocked the path of the ecclesiastical procession for almost an hour, delaying the mass and taxing the efforts of the police to open a narrow lane for the prelates.

As the prelates, bishops and cardinals passed through the fervent multitudes outside the field, hundreds dropped to their knees for the blessing of the legate.

Inside the procession was greeted first by an enthusiastic outburst of handclapping and then with reverent silence and prayer.

Many new recruits were secured for the newly formed old-timers association organized in Salem. A platform had been erected in the grove. Judge L. H. McMahon presided and the program opened with an old-time hymn sung by Judge George H. Burnett of the state supreme court. All joined in the chorus.

of a house that etjuts nine feet into Laurel street was considered, defeated, reconsidered, and finally passed.

A petition by H. E. Canada to build a store on Capitol street was denied.

The appointment of a committee to look into the erection of a public market for Salem was made. The proposed market will be similar to the ones in other cities.

An ordinance permitting the Oregon Electric to relocate a spur on Mill street was adopted, as were also two deeds of right of way for sewers.

A petition to pave Washington street from First street to a place 75 feet west of an alley on John street was referred to the committee on streets and the city engineer.

A sewer extension on 17th street was adopted.

A license to R. L. McCready for selling soft drinks was granted. The proposed improvement of Nebraska avenue from 15 to 20th streets was defeated by remonstrances, according to a report made by the city engineer.

He also stated that the remonstrances against the proposed improvement of Fairground road from the north line of Hood street to the south line of Summer street were insufficient to prevent the improvements.

Alderman Simeral reported on the case of Reynolds vs. City of Salem, and was referred to the city attorney for investigation.

A petition by residents around Oxford Park to prevent its use for baseball games was referred to the committee on health and police.

A petition by D. B. Brown to erect an electric sign at 252 Chemeketa street was referred to the light committee.

Petition of Theodore Rowland and three others to vacate an alley in block 17, Nob Hill annex, was referred to the committee on streets.

A motion to extend south 32d street across the Southern Pacific tracks to Bellevue street was passed. A petition for this purpose will be presented to the public service commission.

DIVINITY DEGREE GIVEN PROFESSOR

Dr. E. S. Hammond Honored at College of Pacific Commencement

News has just been received by Dr. E. S. Hammond, of the Kimball faculty, that the degree of Doctor of Divinity was conferred upon him by the College of the Pacific, located at Stockton, Cal., at the commencement exercises on June 16.

Dr. Hammond took his academy and a part of his college work at Napa college. This school was later taken over by the Stockton institution and the old Napa alumni have interested themselves in Dr. Hammond's behalf and secured his honor for him. The first intimation that he was being considered for this degree came to him in a wire received last week from an old friend and fellow student at Napa, Prof. Henry C. Prof. Tillman is well known in Salem, having formerly been a member of the faculty of Williamette university and later city engineer of Salem.
