380,561 PERMITS ISSUED DRIVERS

Marion County Stands High With 25,724, Polk Receives 6,695

Motor vehicle drivers' permits issued by the state department since July 1, 1920, total 380,561.

The law became effective on that date. Permits issued to special operators total 921, students' permits 370, and duplicates to replace originals that were lost or destroyed, 47,486.
