H. Chance and F. A. Beroud, who travel from coast to coast, wherever they can find work, say that the Salem camp has nothing on which they can register a kick. They had just arrived from California, and stated that it looked about as good as most camps.

"We miss the gas ranges that some camps have," said W. T. Olson, traveling from Los Angeles to Montana on a vacation. "On the whole, however, the camp here is as good or better than any you will find along the coast. The shade trees and grass make it pleasant."

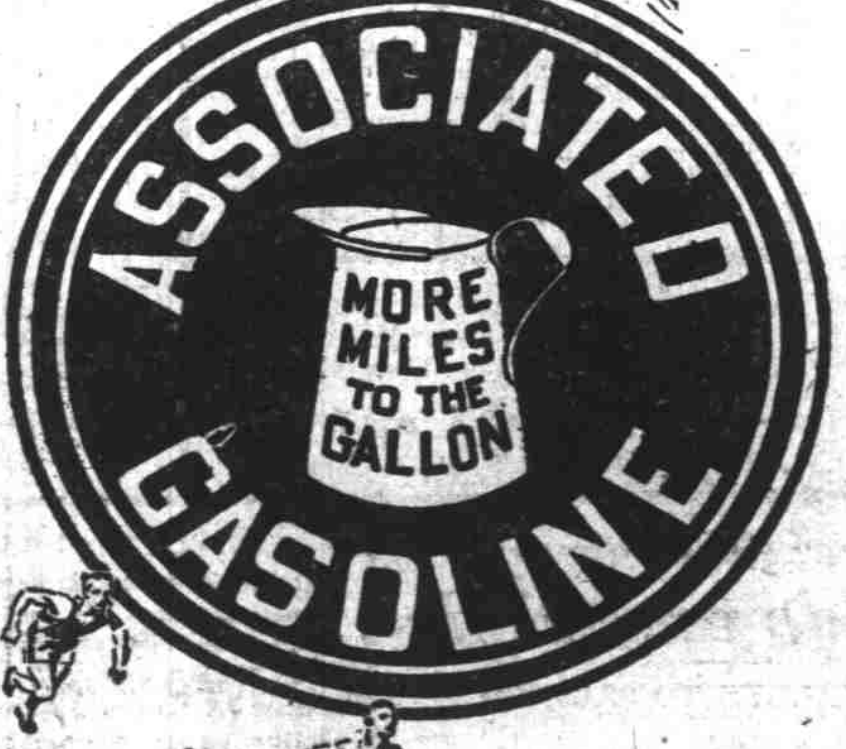
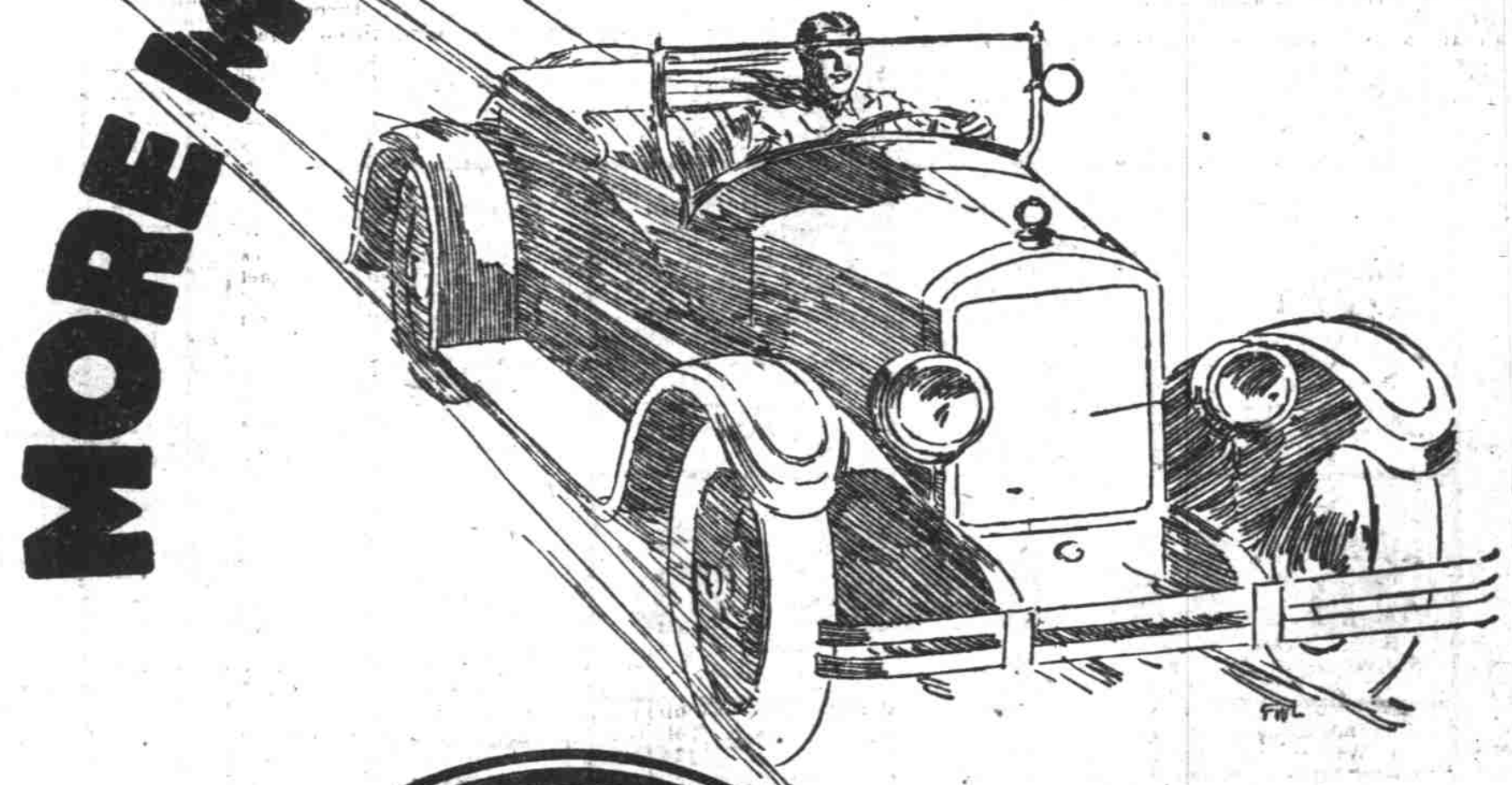
