Favorable Comment Follows Recitals of Monday and Wednesday Evenings

Salem's new quartet played in an artistic manner Wednesday evening at the musicale recital given by Miss Beatrice Shelton. The players who form the quartet are Mary Talmadge Headrick, violin; Julius D. Beebe, cello; Martha Ewart Rowley, organ; and Clarence Wenger, piano. The unusual combination met with much favorable comment. The quartet played two numbers: "Dreams of Love" (Liebestraume, by Franz Liszt, and Romance, Op. 24, by Jean Sibelius; for encore they played Victor Herbert's Serenade.

Mary Jean Porter played two numbers in a marvelously faithful manner, showing her beautiful tones and exquisite delicacy of touch in both Handel's Aeolian Harp and Nibelung's Caprice.

Miss Porter is a pupil of the Sacred Heart academy.

Eleanor Moore, a talented young singer, delighted her audience with two bright numbers charmingly sung: "The Meadow Lark," and "Love's a Merchant." Miss Moore is a senior high school student at Turner and has only studied voice one year, but is attracting attention wherever she sings. Her voice is a high soprano, rich and clear, singing with good interpretation and fine tonal placement. She is a pupil of Minnetta Magers.

Assisting on the Monday evening concert was Miss Florence Warmoth of Portland, a young lady of charming personality who sang in French with fine interpretation and style the difficult aria from "Le Prophete," which was followed by a modern song in English—"The Answer." She responded to an encore with the much-loved song by Kreisler, "The Old Reformer." Miss Warmoth has a rich, warm contralto voice of unusual range. Her sustained high G pianissimo in both the aria and the encore was exquisitely taken.

Miss Warmoth is an artist pupil of Minnetta Magers. Dorothy Walton accompanied her.

Miss Warmoth also sang with Kenneth Allen the beautiful duet from "H Trovatore," "Home to Our Mountains," which reflected credit for both singers. Kenneth Allen is a young singer of much promise whose voice shows marked progress during the past year. He is a general favorite wherever he sings.

The Schubert Octette finished the program with a very interesting number—one of the most pretentious numbers they have presented—the favorite waltz song of Farrar's. The sopranos singing a light coloratura obbligato to a three-part harmony, very charmingly done. The humorous encore, "The Moo-Moo Cow," with Eva Roberts singing the story in child fashion, with the "moo" accompaniment by the rest, amused and delighted the audience.


