Two proposed initiative measures have to do with automobile and truck regulation. One of these seeks to license busses and trucks operating over the highways of the state commercially.

Probably the best known of the referred measures is that one known as the Dennis resolution, a measure sponsored by State Senator Bruce Dennis in the last legislature which would prohibit the levying of income or inheritance taxes in this state for the next 20 years.
