

Famous Horses Are Entered for State Fair Races Here in September

**\$22,000 IN PRIZE
MONEY IS OFFERED**

State Race List Closes July
1, Class Schedule Held
Till August

Prospects are for an especially fine racing program in connection with the annual Oregon state fair, which opens in Salem Sept. 27. Entries in the state races open until August 2. American Trotting association rules govern unless otherwise specified. Purse amounts to \$22,000 have been offered, with two \$2,000 purses made up for the mid-week.

California will ship a number of fine strings north for the meet here, and most of the other western and northwest states will be represented, as will also Canada. The stables at the state fair track have been working out for months past, many green horses coming forward with interesting tentative records to their credit. M. C. Keefer of Pleasanton, Cal., is among the group. He has Roman Mack (a trotter, time 12 1/4), and Nadine, also a trotter, time 11 1/4. H. C. Cox of Canby, Or., has Georgia Hall, a green pacer, and Lady Smith, a green trotter. J. P. Myers of Tacoma has Tramp Spruce, a green trotter, and C. A. Pachingham of Chehalis, Wash., has Hal Steinway, a green pacer. E. M. Warren of Eugene has Dan, a grandson of Dan Patch. This horse is a green pacer, as is also Velma Guy, also owned by Warren. Saxon Boy, a 2:03 pacer, is in the George L. Swisher stable. Mr. McKerron, a pacer, time 2:16, is the property of C. A. Harrison of Yakima. He also owns Oakwood, a green pacer, who has been timed on the Oregon track at 2:18. C. M. Wilson of Salem has Guy Rodgers and Sponsor Boy, green pacers, the latter working out on the half mile track in 9 1/4. Wilson also has Zolock Hall, a pacer, with time 11 1/4.

Ben Hall of Canby has Exponent Mack, a green trotter. J. W. Merrill of Hillsboro has The Cavalier, a pacer; Don Rice a green pacer, and Bill Schultz, a trotter, time 15 1/4. Roscoe Statka of Independence has Hal Mann, a green pacer, and Mr. and Mrs. Brady Davis of Salem have Linnie Ollie D., a green pacer.

Jack Keener of Salem, whose name is known through all the circuits, is working out D. J. Burke, a trotter, time 2 1/4, and William Gray, also a trotter, with time 12 1/4. John K. Healy, a green pacer, has worked out in 13 1/4. He is owned by Healey Bros. of Everett, Wash. J. J. Kadderley of Portland is represented by Hal Brown, a pacer, time 11 1/4. Duncan Brothers of Seattle have Fred W., a green trotter, and C. O. Hillard of Everett is working out Frances Abbey, a green pacer. Fred Woodcock, well known in the Pacific northwest, has three fast horses in the Dakotas at present.

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PLAN FRUIT CONFERENCE

NATIONWIDE DISCUSSION
SLATED FOR SEPTEMBER

PORTLAND, June 28—(By Associated Press)—A nationwide conference of fruit men to lay plans for educating the public on the benefits of eating fruit and for improving the fruit growing industry will be held in Chicago, September 9 and 10. This was announced here today by Paul Stark, of Louisiana, Missouri, president of the American Pomological Society. President Stark is heading a party of 66 fruit growers from 17 eastern and middle western states in a tour of the northwest fruit districts.

Assurance that a large number of fruit growers in the northwest would attend such a conference has already been received by members of the party on the tour.

The party completed a trip through the Willamette valley today and left tonight for a tour of the Yakima and Wenatchee districts in Washington. (*)

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Kaplan Knocks Out Garcia In 10th

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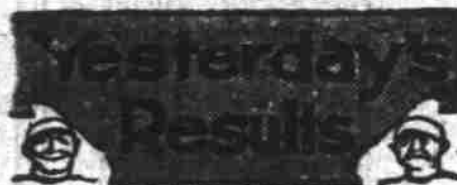
HARTFORD, Conn., June 28.—

world's featherweight champion, successfully defended his title by scoring a knockout over Bobby Garcia of Baltimore in the tenth round of a 10-round match in the Hartford Velodrome tonight. The fight will go down as a technical knockout as the referee stepped in and stopped it after Garcia had taken a count of nine after 54 seconds of fighting in the tenth.

Kaplan took the first three rounds without trouble, but Garcia won the fourth by a hairline margin. The fifth and sixth went to the champion, while the seventh was even. Kaplan did his most

effective work with a right upper cut. In the eighth round Kaplan flashed over a knifing left to the head and crossed with his right and Garcia toppled to the canvas for a count of six. Kaplan followed up effectively, rushing in with both hands and sending Garcia to the floor again for a count of six. Garcia came up slowly and

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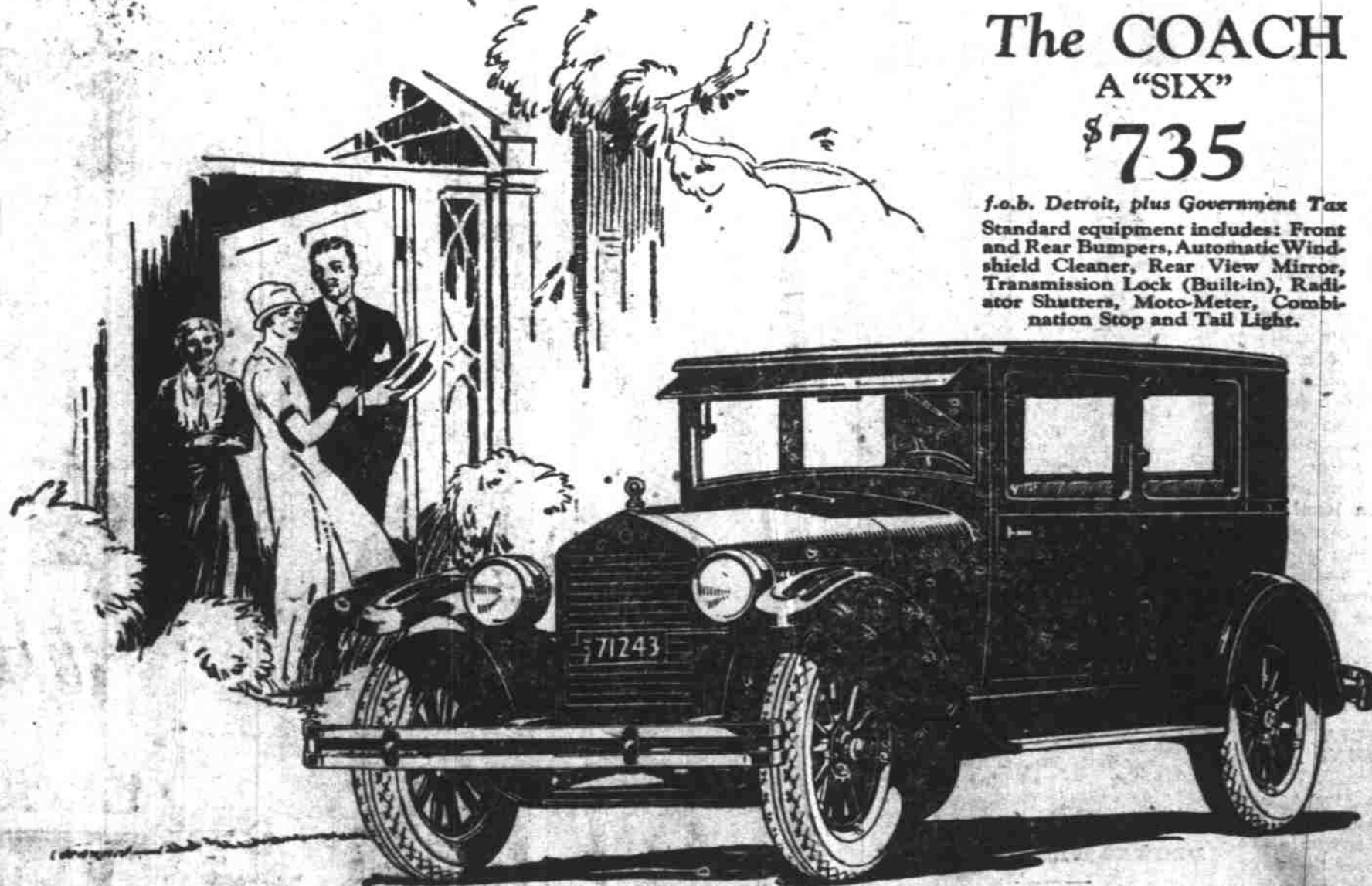
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
