A TOUR WITH ABOUT 40 FARMERS IN MACLEAY AND SHAW DISTRICTS

The Annual Tour of the First National Bank of Salem This Year Took in the Waldo Hills Country in Which Diversified Farming Is Practiced—Some Wonderful Changes for the Better Are Taking Place in That Section

was in diversified farming, checking up on the best and most profitable crops for the section visited. They saw results from the use

of lime in growing such crops as On the parts limed in fields of oats to the acre heavier than on the portions of fields not limed-and the portion of the vetch on one field that had been limed was four times as heavy as the growth on the other portion. Paid for in One Crop

The farmers explained to the visitors that in the one crop of vetch and oats, the cost of the lime had been taken cars of in the value of the increased yield-and that the benefits of the liming would last at least seven years.

They found that a field of sweet clover of 13 acres had pastured 36 cows for seven weeks, furnishing the very finest of feed. C. T. periment was shown, stated that grove shows results of care. in a week or 10 days of rest the cows would be back on the clover kept up all summer. The Rieck farm, Gilbert farm,

Keene farm and Doerfler farm, all in the Waldo Hills country. showed very remarkable diversification of crops and the most up to date methods. The tourists saw filbert and walnut orchards with corn and strawberry crops as fillere; showing the complete utilization of all soil under cultivation. One fine orchard of filberts, only three years old, showed the trees well loaded with nuts this year. The owner told the visitors that. with the growth his trees now showed, he expected a very profitable yield in two years.

All the farmers on the trip were most enthusiastic over such farm development, and expressed themselves many times as appreciating the great value of the trip to them.

A Fuller Report

The following is a fuller report of this tour, given by one of the farmers who was with the crowd making it: "Officials of the First National

bank of Salem on June 18, with farmers, made, as was pronounced by those who attended, one of the most educational tours they had ever been on. A year ago the First National officials made a tour visiting alfalfa fields. Many had said that alfalfa could not be grown in the valley. Fields that would make better than three tons the first cutting were seen within county clerk. six miles of Salem.

"The first trip met with so much success that the bank decided this year to make a trip where diversifled farming was practiced. On this trip the best up to date dairy barns, dairy houses, pure bred and high grade dairy herds and hogs. electric hay unloaders, lime and fertilizer experiments, sweet clover, alfalfa, strawberries, corn, peppermint, walnut and filbert fields, were seen.

"The first stop was made at the F. W. Durbin farm to view their new barn and electric hay unloader. This is the farm that produces the baby milk which is a credit to the city of Salem.

"One may wonder why such a large farm as the Reicks place can be kept so neat and home-like. The limed fields showed great results where votch and clover were grown. The large, new and up to date dairy barn is kept as clean as a parlor. Results are obtained here because the four brothers put their shoulders to the wheel with their father.

on the Jim Nichols farm, where wheat was grown last year that about the same schedule would be produced 65 bushels to the acre, yield even better. While there oats and vetch for their summer succulent feed, which will last till their corn is ready.

> "After lunch, F. A. Doerfler, the bank's farm advisor, gave a few remarks explaining the work he is doing for the farmers through the bank's farm department. W M. Pennington, dealer in real estate, Salem, in his talk, said that he always had a poor opinion of the Waldo Hills; said he had beer in most every state in the Union and the rich corn belt, but now i convinced that this section is as good as any he had ever seen.

> "Mr. Spilman, county agent of Polk county, in his talk, stated that he hoped to be able to each year attend such a tour, and that the bank was doing a wonderful piece of work by getting the farmers to exchange ideas and seeing the newer and more profitable crops and how to handle them."
