WE CAN GET BEET SUGAR FACTORIES

We can get beet sugar factories in Salem, if we will go after them and stay with the quest—
And this is Salem's next best bet.

Why? Because sugar beets are a cultivated crop, a good rotation crop, and, getting their sugar content entirely from the air and the water, and their pulp and tops and molasses by-product being most excellent stock feed, and especially dairy feed, the beet sugar industry builds up the fertility of the soil—

And indeed a score of beet sugar factories could be operated in the Willamette valley, with the help of agricultural lime, and the land devoted to the sugar beets not be missed in our scheme of agriculture. On the contrary, all other crops would be increased in tonnage production by having the beet sugar factories.

The leaf hopper is driving the beet sugar industry a hard race in the districts east of the Cascades and in the inter-mountain region.

Fourteen factories have been driven to the wall in those regions by the leaf hopper. This year, 1000 out of 2500 acres of sugar beets have been abandoned in one Idaho district on account of this insect.

The California beet sugar fields are subject to the ravages of the hopper—

But the country west of the Cascades, in Washington and Oregon, is free from this pest.

This is one of the reasons why we can get beet sugar factories here if we will go after them, and let it be known that we want them now, and not at some distant future time.

We have everything here for the industry. We can grow the beets with a high sugar content. We have the time needed in the process of manufacturing. We have favorable weather conditions for factory operation.

There is idle machinery now, at several points, due to the leaf hopper ravages. This machinery may be had for Salem, if our people will go after it.

One of the idle mills is in the Payson district, Utah. It belongs to the Utah-Idaho Sugar company, which has a factory at Bellingham, Wash., for which our Salem district farmers were ready last spring to grow 500 to 2000 acres or more of sugar beets, on a proposition of absorbing 50 cents a ton of the freight—which proposition fell down for lack of sympathetic cooperation on the part of the railroads.

Why not go after this idle Utah factory machinery for Salem?

Not to grow sugar beets for the Bellingham factory, but for a factory located at Salem?

OREGON PRESTIGE AT WASHINGTON

(Portland Telegram.)

Again seniority scores at Washington, and Senator McNary moves up to the head of the important committee on agriculture and forestry, succeeding Senator Norris, who has resigned the chairmanship. In his present position as chairman of the irrigation and reclamation committee, Senator McNary has rendered much valuable assistance to Oregon. At the head of the still more important agriculture and forestry committee, he will find even greater opportunities for helping his state which is so deeply interested in all matters handled by his committee.

Not since the days of Mitchell and Dolph has Oregon had such strong representation on the big committees as we have enjoyed with McNary on the reclamation committee, and Stanford chairman of public lands. There are few if any other states in the Union that can boast of more than one chairmanship on a Senate committee as important as either of those held by the Oregon members. The prestige that goes with the chairmanship of one of these big committees is shown by the speed with which Stanford forced through his bill reimbursing Oregon counties with about \$5,000,000 unpaid taxes on the withdrawn Southern Pacific land grant.

Secretary Work has demonstrated that he has little or no sympathy with Oregon reclamation projects and that he will do nothing to improve conditions here until he is forced by Congress. His department has taken millions of Oregon money and spent it in other states where it has been lost in some of the worst ventures in reclamation history. Let us hope that Senator McNary will not relinquish his leadership on the reclamation committee until Secretary Work's obstructive policy is supplanted by something constructive.

may glow with a more compelling, the altar fires which they worshipped.

Applause, which greeted his speech from time to time was emphatic when Mr. Coolidge urged law observance, saying that "of course, the government can help to sustain ideals and can create institutions through which ideals can be the better observed but their source by their very nature is in the people," and that "it is not the enactment, but the observance of laws, that creates the character of a nation."

"In my opinion," he said, "very little of just criticism can attach to the theories and principles of our institutions. There is far more danger of harm than there is hope of good in any radical changes. We do need a better understanding and comprehension of them and a better knowledge of the foundations of government in general."

Arriving at 11 o'clock, accompanied by Attorney General Sargent, Senator Ernest of Kentucky, his friends, Frank W. Stearns of Boston as well as Secretary Everett Sanders and his military and naval aides, Mr. Coolidge was driven for four miles along Broad street and the exposition grounds to the stadium.

After the exercises, the president and Mrs. Coolidge were guests of Mayor Kendrick at a private luncheon in the Bellevue-Stratford hotel and then on their way to the new bridge they visited Independence Hall. Entering the building, Mr. Coolidge sat in the chair of John Hancock who led all the signers of the Declaration of Independence and then proceeded to the central hall where the historic Liberty Bell is enshrined, studied it closely and placed his hands upon it with reverent touch.

The trip across the great suspension bridge, the largest of its kind in the world, followed, thousands roaring a greeting to the

Returning across the bridge, Mr. Coolidge went immediately to his special train on the Pennsylvania. He and Mrs. Coolidge stood on the observation platform and waved goodbye to the crowds which shouted farewell as the train pulled out for Washington.

INSANE 46 YEARS, DIES

B. F. KINZER PASSES LIFE IN STATE INSTITUTION

Benjamin F. Kinzer, the oldest patient of the Oregon state hospital for insane in point of years spent in the institution, died at the hospital here today at the age

of 64 years. Kinzer was committed to the old Hawthorne sanitarium in Portland from Linn county October 25, 1880, being transferred to the state hospital here when that institution was first opened, and had therefore been an inmate of insane institutions for 46 years. In all of the time Kinzer has been at the state hospital he had

never been away from the institution at all. He was regarded as absolutely harmless and had the freedom of the hospital grounds at all times.

At the time of his commitment he was only 18 years of age. His commitment papers are signed by L. Flinn, county judge of Linn county, and by Dr. D. M. Jones and Dr. B. M. Savor.
