Arriving at the last possible moment after several time allowances had been given the Oregon national guard team, scratched nine players gathered and blanked the P. E. P. 6-0.

Both pitchers hurled a fine game, only three hits being made off Merritt the losing pitcher. The P. E. This cut down the effect of Merritt's strike outs, although he registered four as did Manning.

This was the last scheduled game for the P. E. P. although it is claimed there are some postponed contests to be played. These will be played at the end of the regular league schedules.

The Guardsmen did not bunch their scores last night, there being only one inning that more than one run crossed. They scored in every inning, but would not have piled up such a one sided count had it not been for eight bobbles by the electricians. Promiscuous base stealing by the soldiers featured the contest, 12 stolen bags being registered for the game.

# Harold Osburn Holds Title As National Athletic Champ In Decathlon

## ILLINOIS CLUBMAN PILES HONORS HIGH

Left Leg Taped, Harold Osborn Retains Title of All Around Champion

PHILADELPHIA, July 6.—(By Associated Press.)—Finishing the last three events with his left leg bound in tape, due to a muscle strain, Harold M. Osborn, blond-haired star of the Illinois Athletic club retained his title as champion today after a strenuous all national all around athletic championship battle with ten opponents.

Osborn set the pace from start to finish in the ten event program, making up the decathlon which shared the spotlight with the relays in the closing day of the national senior AAU track and field championships at the municipal stadium. In approximately eight hours of steady competition he amassed a total of 7,187,832 points, nearly 400 more than his nearest rival and clubmate, Harry Frieda, who finished with a score of 6,820,346.

Clifford Hoffman of the Olympic club, San Francisco, finished third and prevented a clean sweep for the four Illinois AC entrants. These pupils of Johnny Behr, IAC coach romped off with four of the first five places, Pete Wallace and Paul Jones taking fourth and fifth places to supplement the performances of Osborn and Frieda.

Osborn won first place in only one event, the high jump, but finished second in three others, the javelin, 110 meter hurdles and the broad jump, besides scoring well up in all others except the 1500 meter run in which he was seventh.

## THOUGHT OFFICER WAS ROBBER, SAYS

"Shiek Bandit" Tells Tale of Killing in 45 Minutes; Grilled Severely

CHICAGO, July 6.—(By Associated Press.)—Earnestly and quietly with an occasional smile playing across his pale features, Martin J. Durkin told in 45 minutes today the story of the shooting of Edwin C. Shanahan, federal secret service agent, and the events surrounding it.

He testified for himself in his trial for the murder of Shanahan, shot to death last October 11 when he accosted the youth in a South side garage to arrest him for interstate transportation of a car the government said was stolen. For more than three hours he stood upon his story and embellished it under a rigid cross examination by prosecutors not budged from his first outline of it as he followed the state's attorney through a labyrinth of interrogations covering his life from the time he joined the Canadian army at the age of 16 until the time of his arrest three months after the killing.

Shanahan, he thought to be a holdup man, Durkin testified. He never suspected he was an officer until he was told after the shooting that he had shot a revenue man. He thought Shanahan was a holdup man because he "stuck a gun on me" and because he reached for Durkin's "money pocket." He lived in some fear of holdup men, he said, for he was a bootlegger in Chicago and California, and carried large sums of money, which he always protected with a revolver.
