

**ALFRED McCULLY,  
PIONEER, PASSES**

For 35 Years Steamboat Engineer on Oregon Rivers, Born 1853

Alfred M. McCully, 72, of Butteville, Ore., died here Saturday after an illness of several years. He was a son of David and Mary Ann McCully, pioneers of 1852. He was born July 9, 1853, at Harrisburg, Ore., where the family located on their arrival in Oregon, and moved to Salem at the age of three years.

On October 31, 1874, he was married to Violet Geer, at Salem, living here until 1894, when he moved to The Dalles, later locating on the old Geer farm near Butteville, where he lived until a short time ago when he was brought here for medical treatment.

For thirty-five years he was engineer on the boats running on the Willamette and Columbia rivers and was well known in steamboat circles of early days. He is survived by two sons, Archie D. and Guy G. McCully, both living on the home place, and one sister, Mrs. A. N. Gilbert, of Salem, and one brother, Frank D. McCully, of Enterprise, Ore. His wife and one son, William McCully, passed away during the last few years.

Funeral services will be held at the Miller chapel at Aurora, Wednesday, July 7, at 2 p. m. Interment will be at the Geer cemetery on the home place near Butteville.

University of Oregon Medical School to Conduct Classes July 26

An institute of physicians and nurses of Oregon will be held in Salem during the week of July 26 to 30, according to announcement made here yesterday. The institute will be held under the direction of the University of Oregon medical school, cooperating with the Marion County Child Health Demonstration.

Dr. W. H. Draper, assistant surgeon-general of the United States Public Health Service at Washington, will be one of the principal speakers. Other speakers will include Dr. Richard B. Dillehunt, dean of the University of Oregon medical school; Dr. Estella Ford Warner, of the Marion County Child Health Demonstration, and Dr. G. C. Bellinger, superintendent of the State Tuberculosis Hospital.

**TRAFFIC CHECK-UP  
SHOWS CARS THICK**

One Driver From Out of the State Listed for Every 3 Oregon Licenses

A total of 121,971 vehicles passed given points in the state of Oregon between the hours of 6 a. m. and 10 p. m., Wednesday, June 16, according to counts made by representatives of the state highway department.

Of the total number of vehicles reported 78,104 were passenger vehicles licensed in the state of Oregon, 28,327 were cars from other states while 1760 were stages and busses. There were 7645 trucks of one and one-half tons or less capacity, 4353 trucks of more than one and one-half tons capacity and 529 motorcycles. Horse-drawn vehicles numbered 753 or only .063 per cent of the total vehicles counted at the various stations.

The largest number of vehicles passed the Parkplace bridge located approximately 2 miles north of Oregon City. A total of 3819 vehicles were counted at this point, including 2874 machines bearing Oregon licenses, 354 passenger cars from other states, 652 trucks and 15 motorcycles.

Near the junction of the Medford-Klamath Falls highway in Southern Oregon a total of 2045 vehicles were counted. These included 1988 cars bearing Oregon licenses, 651 machines from other states, 42 stages and busses, 312 trucks, two motorcycles and two horse-drawn vehicles.

The report of the highway department showed that of the total cars counted 84.04 per cent were licensed in Oregon, 23.63 per cent were non-resident passenger cars, 1.44 per cent were stages and busses, 6.27 per cent were trucks of one and one-half tons or less capacity, 3.57 per cent were trucks of more than one and one-half tons capacity, .42 per cent were motorcycles and .62 per cent were horse-drawn vehicles.
