

Preliminary Work Is Already Started on Land Grant Tax Refund Bill

WORK GOING AHEAD, STANFIELD STATES

County Judges Are Asked to
Begin Extension of County
Tax Rolls

PORTLAND, July 15.—(By Associated Press.)—The department of the interior has already started preliminary work preparatory to paying the Oregon and California land grant tax refund according to a telegram received today by C. C. Chapman from Senator Stanfield.

ing telegram to judges and assessors in the 18 counties in Oregon which are to participate in the refund and Clarke county in Washington.

"Senator Gore and I have induced the interior department to engage on work relative to the distribution of the Oregon and California fund. While the law will not be engrossed and before them for ten days they are going ahead on the terms of the bill with which the law is identical.

"You should begin the extension of the tax rolls preparatory to billing the department for your claim in order that no time is lost.

"The first payment will probably be between six and seven million dollars on which the interest to the counties is worth more than \$10,000 daily. Senator Gore is writing you fully. He will remain here until departmental

requirements are determined."

Senator Gore is W. H. Gore of Medford, who was a member of the committee representing Oregon counties which was sent to Washington to lobby for the bill.

J. T. Hunt, Marion county judge, received a telegram from Senator Stanfield Thursday, in which the county was advised to begin work as soon as possible on the extension of the tax rolls, upon which the claims will be based.

It is not yet known how much the tax refund will net this county, and this cannot be determined until the work is well under way. Judge Hunt announced.

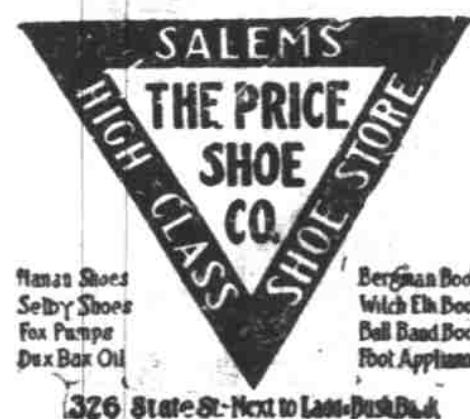
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
